ARE LICENSED TO PREACH

FIVE QUEEN'S GRADUATES SO AUTHORIZED BY PRESBYTERY

An Impressive Service in Chalmers Church Thursday Evening—Principal Ross Delivered the Address.

A most impressive service was held in Chalmers Church on Thursday night, when five young men who have just completed their course in Queen's Theological College, were licensed to preach. One of the number also received ordination, at the hands of the Kingston Presbytery.

The young men licensed were J. J. Black, B.A., B.D., of Scotland; W. J. Scott, B.A., B.D., of Beaverton; C. R. F. MacLennan, B.A., B.D., of Lake Umbagog, C.B.; J. McKillop, B.A., of Scotland, and H. V. Workman of Wolfe Island. Mr. Scott received ordination. Owing to illness, Mr. MacLennan was unable to be present for the ceremony, but was granted license. He is laid up in the General Hospital, suffering from an attack of appendicitis.

Rev. J. Rattra, of Tweed, Moderator of the Kingston Presbytery, presided, and there was quite a large number of the members of the Presbytery present, and a fair-sized congregation. Chalmers choir was present, and took part in the musical part of the service.

Rev. E. R. McLean, of Cooke's Church, and Rev. J. D. Boyd, of Zion Church, took part in the devotional exercises.

Rev. W. T. Wilkins, of Trenton, clerk of the Presbytery, read the names of the students making application for license, and in so doing, remarked that the class this year was not as large as in former years. He stated that the war had affected the Theological College in the same manner as it had other institutions of learning. He also stated that there were three Bachelors of Divinity in the class.

After the announcement of the clerk of the Presbytery, the Moderator proceeded with the ceremony connected with the granting of license, and ordination, following which Principal Ross, of Queen's Theological College, addressed the candidates.

Dr. Ross delivered a most thoughtful and inspiring address. At the outset, he stated that the candidates had now reached the goal they had for a long time been looking forward to. He pointed out that the true end of education was in knowing one's self. He congratulated the candidates and stated that he wished to give them a few words to help stimulate them in their work. He stated that they must consecrate themselves to their work. To secure the best results in their work, they must seek the glory of God. Their devotion must be similar to that of Paul. They must consider how best they could use their talents. Without this spirit, their preaching would be of no avail. They must keep continually before them the very highest ideals. Their goal should be nothing short of perfection. There must be hard study, to make a success of their ministry.

"Never in the history of the church was there ever more need for ministers of thorough training," added the speaker. "The drain on your resources from week to week, and from year to year will be very heavy. You must be capable of dealing with the spiritual needs of men. The preaching of to-day must of necessity be different in its form to that of say twenty years ago. The preachers must keep step with the times. The preacher who is not moving on with thought is preaching to the dead past, and the living present do not understand or appreciate him as he believes they should. The preacher finds fault with his congregation when he himself is to blame for not keeping step with the times. The preacher must also be a man of vision, and present the needs of men and shape his methods to meet the requirements."

"The completion of your future depends largely on the way you employ every minute of your time from now on. Make the best of all your time and do not allow anything to take up your time that is not profitable. Be possessed of the spirit of self-sacrifice."

WESTERN CROP REPORT.

Alberta Acreage Increase Equal Possibly 20 Per Cent.

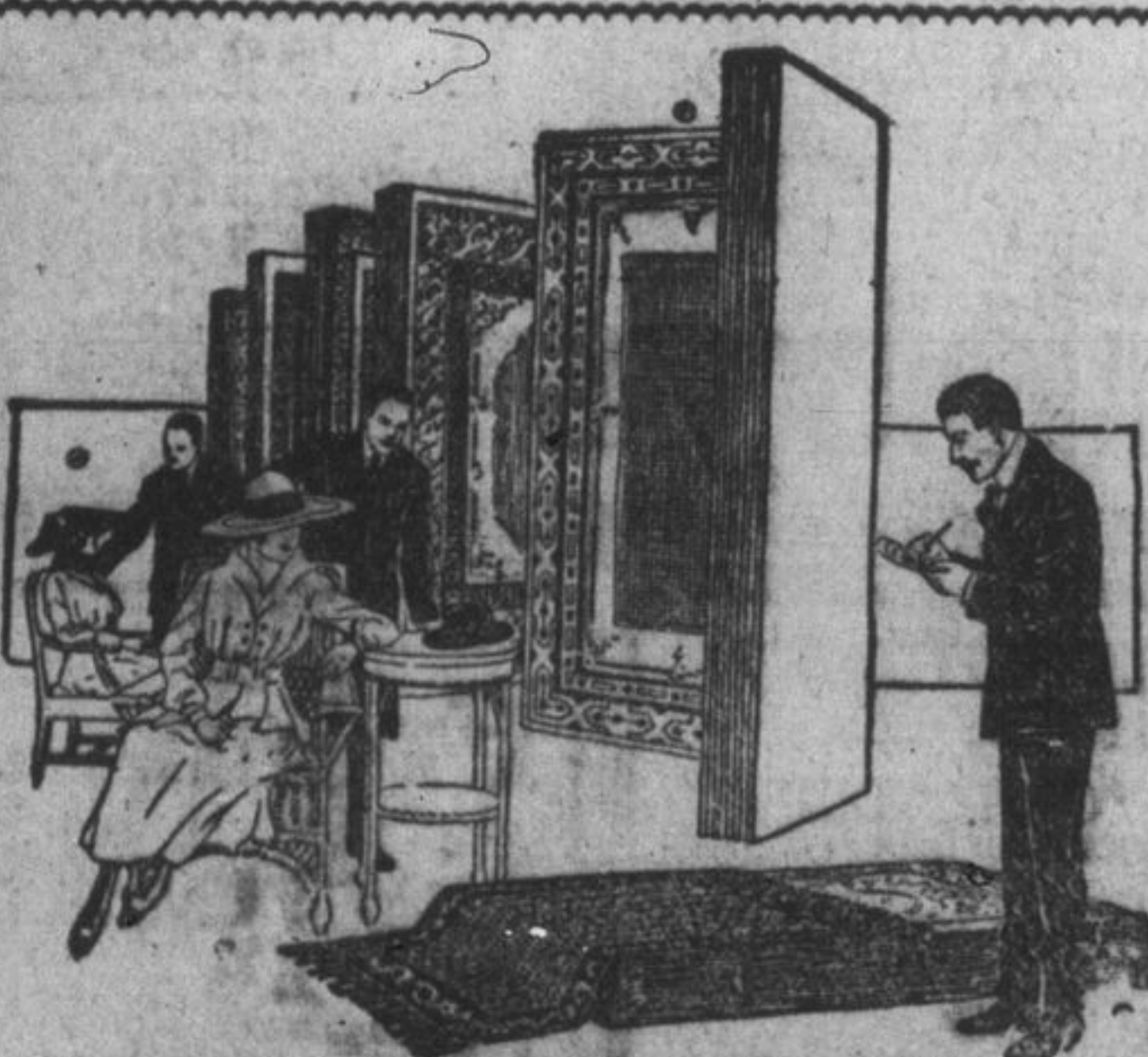
