## EMPLOYERS URGED TO ALLOW MEN TO GO ON FARMS.

Further Assist—A Girls' Branch in Gardening Being Organized.

The executive committee of the Greater Production Organization met in the mayor's office on Friday afternoon. The secretary, John Greenlee, reported that the ploughing of vacant lots was under the management of Ald. J. W. Smith. The latter reported that all sod would be ploughed and assistance would be given to those who could not afford to plough their plots.

The question of labor for the farms was taken up by Capt. Trousdale. He conducts a registration office on the Market Square for the purpose of bringing the farmer and laborer together. He reported that up to the present very little had been done. The farmers want experienced help and are willing to pay from \$35 to \$50 a month. He felt that employers should help by allowing men leave for farm work and holding their positions for them till after harvest. In Toronto firms encouraged their employees to go on the farms and if he cannot get the men here he will go to Toronto. Labor is scarcer than skilled help now.

A resolution was passed authorizing the mayor and the agricultural committee to take up the question of farm labor with the Board of Education with a view to placing the boys on farms. One hundred boys have already been placed with farmers for this season.

Mrs. Buff reported that a girls' branch was being organized and a girls' camp would be formed with the co-operation of Miss Harvey and their services used in gardening.
