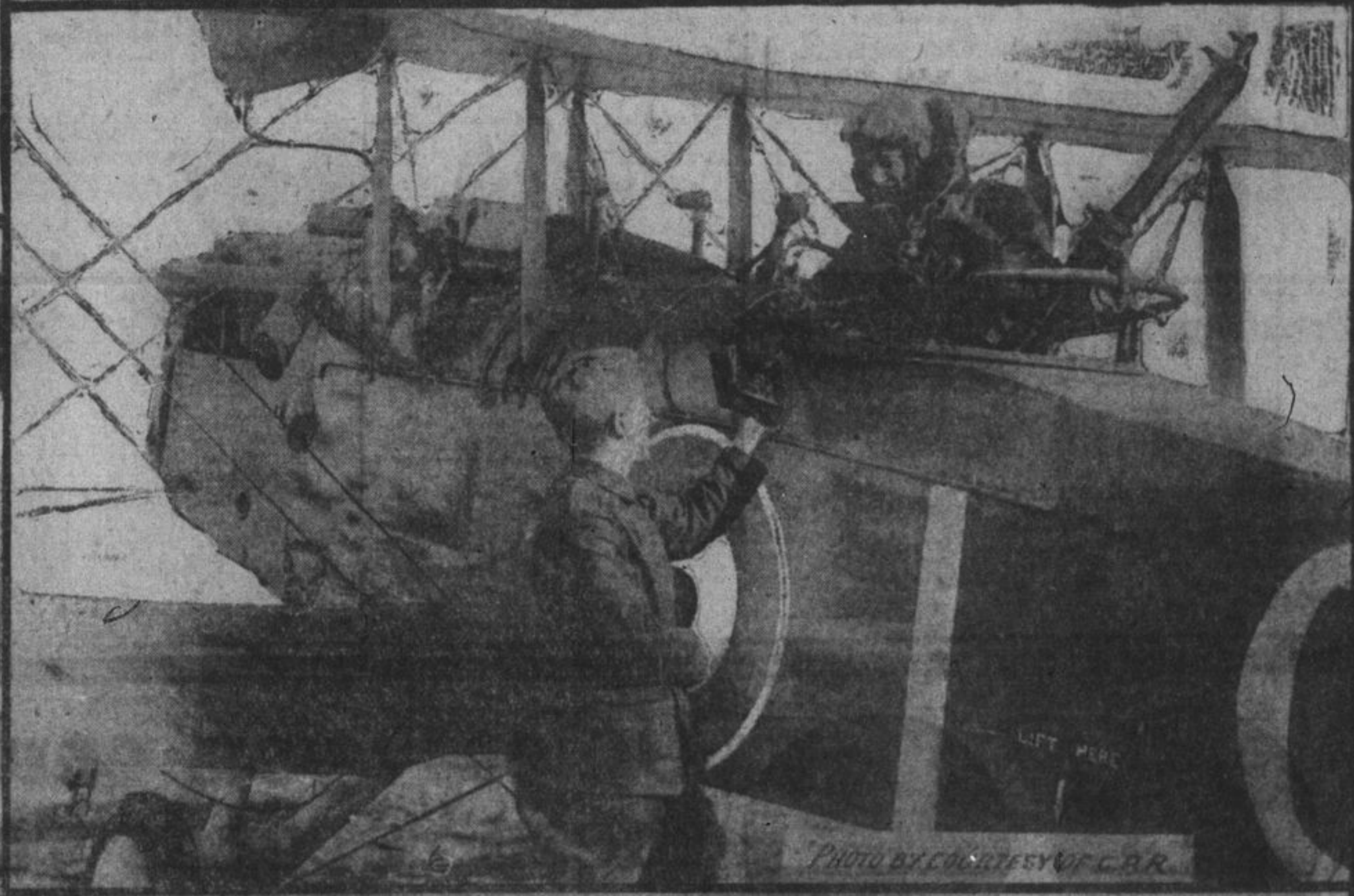

SECURES CROIX DE GUERRE.

THE King of the Belgians has awarded the posthumous honours of Chevalier de l'Ordre de Léopold and the Croix de Guerre to the late Lieut. G. de Pret-Roose de Calesberg, who, previous to the war, was employed in the European Manager Office of the C. P. R. bearing Cross. This gallant young officer was awarded with the Belgian Army since the outbreak of war and took part in the battles of Oostende and Louvain. He was killed, gallantly encouraging his men in the defence of a section of the first line trenches in front of Dixmude.

ON the morning of March 20th, 1918, the King held an investiture at Buckingham Palace, and decorated Engineer Commander A. E. Philip, late of the C. P.
