BRITISH-AMERICAN TAKEN INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

FOR KINGSTON HOSTEL BY THE SALVATION ARMY.

To be Used For Returned Soldiers—Adjutant Smith to be Manager—Building to be Renovated.

The British-American hotel is to be re-opened under the name of the British-American Hostel. It will be under the management of the Salvation Army. Col. McMillan, chief secretary, Brigadier Miller, architect and Major Jennings, all of the headquarters staff, Toronto, accompanied by Adjutant Smith local representative, made a thorough inspection of the building Wednesday morning. The dining-room will be enlarged and have a chapel adjoining for family prayer twice a day. There are at present seventy-five bedrooms, but more will be added, and a number of dormitories as well.

The work of the alterations will be done under contract by C. J. Graham, according to plans, which have been approved by the army architect. Col. McMillan stated that it is the desire of the army to provide good accommodation for returned soldiers in the centres of the large districts. At London, Ont., the Cecil Hotel has been secured. It is felt that the Crossman hotel in Kingston, which the army should anticipate demolition by being in a position to provide good rooms and good meals. Adjutant Smith will be manager and Ensign Horton director of internal economy at the British-American.

OBITUARY

Late Harold Glover.

Much sorrow was expressed by his many acquaintances in Kingston, over the death, which occurred at his home in Gananoque, on Tuesday, of Harold Glover, who for some time was employed as barber with Frederick Elmer, of this city. Deceased, who was twenty-two years of age, was very highly esteemed by a wide circle of friends. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Glover, of Gananoque, and was born in Gananoque. He attended the public and high school in that town, and at the age of sixteen, learned the barber trade in his home town, where he worked for some time, later on coming to Kingston with Frederick Elmer. He also worked for some time in Detroit but on account of ill health, he returned to Kingston. This was in December last, but he only worked seven weeks as he became so ill that he had to give up his position. The end came rather suddenly, as during the past few days he had shown much improvement. He suffered from hemorrhage of the lungs.

Deceased is survived by his father and mother, one sister, Miss Eva, at home, and William, of Kingston. An older brother, Fred Glover, was killed at the battle of Vimy Ridge, on April 10th 1917.
