EXPRESS DISSATISFACTION

WITH LIBERTIES GIVEN ALIENS IN CANADA.

The Civil and Military Vigilance Committee of Kingston sends a Resolution to W. F. Nickle, M.P.

At a combined meeting of the committee of the Army and Navy Veterans and Trades and Labor Council, held Sunday evening, the sub-committee appointed to investigate alien labor submitted reports. These were considered and much dissatisfaction was expressed. Some cases of discrimination in favor of aliens were reported.

The action of the United States Government in interfering with aliens and confiscating their property despite naturalization was mentioned and the question was asked why the Canadian Government satisfied with mere registration which the alien liberty to engage in profitable business and obtain knowledge of every department of industry?

The following resolution was passed: That this association deplores the lax manner in which the law regarding enemy aliens is carried out and desires that a copy of this resolution be sent to the member for Kingston.

A resolution was passed defining clearly the work and aims of the organization, and the name adopted is "The Civil and Military Vigilance Committee of Kingston."

TANNERS IN TROUBLE; THREATEN TO STRIKE

Will Walk Out if Man Dismissed Is Not Taken Back.

At a meeting of the newly-formed Tanners' Union complaint was made that an employee had been dismissed from Davis' tannery, and the claim was also made that he had been dismissed because of his relations with the union. The matter was discussed, and it was decided to have the matter brought before the Minister of Labor at Ottawa. J. C. Waters, president of the Trades Congress, will take the matter up for the union under the Disputes Act. Steps are also being taken to have the matter dealt with as speedily as possible.

At the meeting it was stated that a vote had been taken and that the men have voted to go out on strike if the man dismissed was not taken back.

The Trades and Labor Council appointed a committee a week ago in an endeavor to have a settlement made, but the committee reported that the company refused to open negotiations with them for a settlement.
