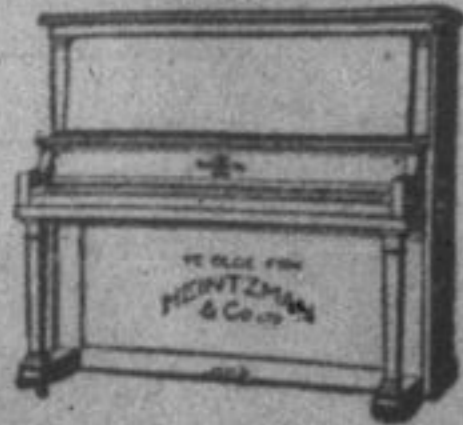

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Music in the Home

From Rags to Symphonies. At the conclusion of a recital by Paderowski once, an excitable young music lover rushed to the artist's room and exclaimed "Oh, Mr. Paderowski, you took me right into heaven to-night," to which the Polish pianist replied, "Glad to see you back again, sir."

Did you know Sir Frederick Cowen, the great English musician, was born in Jamaica? At the age of eight he composed an opera. When only seventeen, he produced his symphony in C minor, and it is said of his "The Rose Maiden" that it has been performed by almost every small choral society on earth.

According to a Japanese paper, western operatic works have reached Japan. In the Royal Theatre Tokyo there was given Mascagni's "Cavalleria" to an appreciative audience.

At the annual meeting of the Bristol Musical Club a Dr. Basil Harwood referred to the curious habit of some English composers giving foreign titles to their pieces. By foreign titles he did not mean such ordinary names as Pastoral, Scherzo, and such for these by common usage have become a part of our everyday musical language; but rather certain French and German titles used when plain English would have done quite as well. "Such affectation," said Dr. Harwood, "survives as a relic of the wretched tradition that the foreign musician's work must necessarily be better than that of the Englishman."

If there were one spot on this globe where we would rather expect to find music conspicuous by its absence it would be in the prisoner's settlements in Siberia. But we are wrong. A Swede named Hartved has made a collection of songs gathered among the prisoners in Siberia of which one who heard samples of them said "formed one of the most interesting contributions to folklore in my experience and are heartily recommended to singers in search of the unfamiliar yet beautiful." It is understood that several volumes of these songs now exist.

Even humble organ-blowers should not go forgotten when their duties are faithfully performed. In a churchyard in Wales may be seen the grave of an organ-blower, one Meredith Morgan, over whom has been erected a stone bearing this epitaph: Under this stone lies Meredith Morgan. Who blew the bellows of our church organ; Tobacco he hated, to smoke most unwilling; Yet never so pleased as when pipes he was filling; No reflection on him for rude speech could be cast; Tho' he gave our old organist many a blast; No puffer was he, Tho' a capital blower.

THE WORLD'S NEWS IN BRIEF FORM

Tidings From All Over Told in a Pithy and Pointed Way.

Owing to a smallpox epidemic in the barracks at Charlottetown, P.E.I., the calling of draftees has been postponed until May 26th.

Edward Mason, Ottawa, aged nineteen years, was sentenced to serve three months in jail for idleness. The charge was laid by his mother.

The Faith, the largest concrete steamer in the world, will make her first ocean trip from California to Vancouver with a cargo of salt.

The United States Shipping Board has submitted its budget for construction purposes. It amounts to \$2,225,835,000 for shipbuilding, plants and material.

Laurence C. Hodgson, Independent, who ran on the loyalty issue, was elected mayor of St. Paul over Julius F. Emme, Socialist, by one of the largest majorities ever returned.

Col. Currie, in the Budget debate, stated that Canadian munition manufacturers accepting orders from the United States were compelled to pay 7 1/2 per cent. commission to the Imperial Munitions Board.

The von Bernstorff code, the cryptic means of communication employed by the German Foreign Office to keep in touch with Count Johann von Bernstorff while the latter was directing sabotage and other German activities in the United States has been deciphered, reconstructed and turned over to the Federal Government.

Complete System Planned. Hamilton, May 10.—Ontario has planned a very complete system of Provincial highways, stated W. A. McLean, at Hamilton. He was discussing a paper read on "Who Should Pay for the Road?" It would have roads extending from one end of the Province to the other, from those could diverge country roads, paid for by the county, and from them township roads paid for by the townships. These latter would be a light type of construction.

"Everyone in Canada must share in the cost of these, as they do in the United States. I've always felt that we would never have a complete system of good roads in Ontario until the cities and towns jots equally with the counties in paying."

Mr. McLean announced that the Ottawa-Prentiss highway would be 65 feet in width if the present plans were carried out, and that he was thoroughly in favor of having all Provincial highways constructed at that width in future, if possible.

TO FRIGHTEN NEUTRALS.

German Boasts of Atrocities She Committed.

Washington, May 9.—Tentative frightfulness as practised in France and Belgium has been made the subject of a German warning to neutral nations of the fate which they may expect if they take up arms against the Central Powers.

"If there are any still thinking of siding with the Allies, let them take warning from the fate of others," says the warning. It is in the form of a circular, which recites the amount of booty seized in France and Belgium, the number of churches damaged and destroyed, the money wrung from the stricken inhabitants, and, finally, the deliberate mistreatment of British prisoners-of-war.

40 TO 50 MILLIONS

British Columbia's Income Soon From Pulp and Paper.

Vancouver, May 10.—The prediction that within a few years British Columbia will receive an income of between forty million and fifty million dollars a year from the production of pulp and paper was made in an interview here by George M. Seaman, President of the Seaman Paper Company of New York and Chicago, and a director of the Whalen Pulp and Paper Mills, Limited, of Vancouver.

New Type of Gun.

Paris, May 9.—Second Lieut. Job, director of a military chemical laboratory, and Lieut. de Capigny, attached to military chemical section, have been decorated with the Legion of Honor for "exceptional services." The first of these services was the discovering and perfecting a new gas body, greatly increasing the effect of the fire of certain classes of rifles, and the second was for making the manufacture of this body a success.
