## DOYLE COMES BACK.

Putting Up Sensational Game For New York Giants.

The "come-back" of Larry Doyle has been the sensation of the baseball season. Laughing, larruping Larry took his foot out of the grave and removed the other from off a hamsa peel and is now playing as well as any time in his career.

Late in the summer of 1916 McGraw acquired Herzog and sold Doyle to the Cubs. The Polo Grounds went in mourning. Doyle had been one of the most popular players in Giant livery for nine years, and every fan regretted his departure—which seemed to mean that Larry was "through" as a player.

Doyle had no sooner joined the Cubs when Miss Fortune tripped him up again and broke his leg. This severe injury threatened to put him out of the game for all time, and even the most optimistic conceded that Larry's days as a big league ball player were numbered few. Doyle played last season handicapped with a sore leg. He played badly. There is little doubt that the Cub management was anxious to be rid of him.

Then came Herzog's break with the Giants, and it was up to McGraw to secure a new second baseman. The three-cornered deal between the Braves, Cubs and Giants, involving Herzog, Tyler, Doyle, Barnes—and Jimmy Smith was put over, and Doyle—the ever-laughing Larry—was a Giant once more.

Although all were glad to see Doyle back again, few dared hope that he would make good particularly after his accident. Then, too, it is Doyle's eleventh season in the big league.

But Larry fooled 'em. He has hit about .500 to date and has been fielding better than ever.

And everybody's happy.

**JIMMY DISSETTE MUST GO.**  
Exemption Refused Well-known Hockey Player.

Exemption was refused to "Jimmy" Dissette, the well-known St. Michael's College Hockey Club defence player. Dissette was for several years captain of the team and led them to victory in the O.H.A. senior series in 1909 and 1910, when they defeated the 14th Regiment team of Kingston and the Parkdale Canoe Club aggregation.

One brother, Pit-Lieut. Arthur Dissette, was killed in France and another, Frank Dissette, died a week ago. Another brother, Eddie Dissette, is still left at home.

**Racing Flourishes in Britain.**  
The Irish Grand National Steeplechase of the value of £1,000, was recently run off over the Fairhouse course of three miles and won by E. W. Hope Johnstone's Ballyboggan, ridden by Hawkins, three lengths ahead of J. Kiernan's All Sorts, with Carbery in the saddle.

J. J. Maher's Llangollen, who managed to get up, one length behind. Thirteen horses went to the post. The betting was: Ballyboggan, even; All Sorts, 100 to 14; and Llangollen, 6 to 1.

Frank Bullock, the famous English flat race jockey, who went to Australia to ride last year, was in rare form at a recent meeting at Perth, W.A., when he rode nine winners.

The owner of the unbeaten New Zealand crack horse, Desert Gold, has decided to give all the proceeds of the famous mare for the endowment of cots for wounded soldiers of New Zealand and Australia.

The totalizer was first used in New South Wales on Feb. 13 of last year, and from that date to the end of November the revenue received amounted to \$140,000, representing a gross investment of \$2,000,000.

**Moving To Montreal.**  
George and William McPherson, who have had a string of trotting horses at the Ogdensburg Fair Grounds training stables the past two years, have decided to remove to Montreal. They have disposed of their star pacer, Fern Hal, a Grand Circuit performer, and will take the balance of the stable with them to Montreal. The business racing prospect in northern New York is not very attractive at the present time in the estimation of the McPhersons and they decided to seek a larger field for their season's operations.

"Spider" Kelley, of San Francisco, formerly a clever lightweight fighter and more widely known as a second and trainer of boxers, was engaged at Chicago by Jess Willard to act as trainer, adviser and chief second for the championship in the latter's proposed battle for the title with Fred Fulton.

Kelley, whose ability to dispel gloom around training camps, is pronounced among boxing enthusiasts, will have complete charge of Willard's preparation, it is understood.

## WAR CLOUD IN FAVORED

Worked Derby Distance Wednesday in Fast Time of 2:05 2-5.

From the present outlook there will be about ten horses in the Kentucky Derby field that will go to the post on Saturday. A. K. Macomber, who is making his third attempt to capture the event, will again have the honor of starting the favorite. This is War Cloud, an imported son of Polymelus—Dreamy, that was made choice after Willis Sharpe Kilmer's imported Sun Briar, and Kenneth D. Alexander's Escoba, which have been the leading candidates all winter, failed to show good form in their first starts this year, but the latter gained friends by winning the Derby trial on Monday.

War Cloud's stock received a big boost Wednesday when he worked the full Derby distance of a mile and a quarter in 2:05 2-5, with Loftus in the saddle, and full weight on. This is said to be the fastest time trial ever made by a Derby candidate, and is far better than that of any

other of the present eligibles. War Cloud's effort created a sensation, and he now promises to go to the post an overwhelming favorite.

## PRIZE FIGHT BARRED.

Willard and Fulton Cannot Fight in Connecticut.

Governor Marcus H. Holcomb has refused to permit the Willard-Fulton fight to take place in Connecticut. Recently James P. Mulvihill, of New Haven, who has been seeking to bring the fight to this state, wrote to the Governor asking for his sanction. Governor Holcomb, in a reply, made public yesterday, by Mulvihill, declines to permit the bout to be staged in that state.
