Sir Robert Borden has already announced that whatever else happens the Civil Service Bill will be proceeded with. This will take several days as there are no loss than fifty-six clauses. Some of the members object strongly to all control of minor appointments, such as rural postmasters, being placed in the hands of the Civil Service Commission. They claim they are not fighting for patronage, but that as representatives of the people they should be consulted in regard to appointments solely affecting their ridings.
