MOST SOD LAND PLOUGHED INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

THOSE UNABLE TO PAY ARE TO BE HELPED.

Greater Production Committee Has 150 Vacant Lots For Cultivation—Asks Civic Finance Committee For Additional Grant.

The Greater Production Committee met Monday afternoon. The sub-committee in charge of the ploughing operations reported that nearly all of the sod land was ploughed. The question of ploughing lots broken last year was taken up, but owing to the reduction of the sum appropriated for the work and the difficulty of discriminating between applicants, it was thought that the balance of the time should be spent in carrying out the original policy of giving aid to those who were in need and unable to pay for the work. Aids J. W. Smith and Armstrong were instructed to see that those in need of help should have their plots ploughed for them.

The secretary reported that very satisfactory progress had been made in securing vacant lots, and applicants were at hand to cultivate them. The number now totalled 150. It was decided to ask the civic finance committee to donate a small amount of money to see the work through, and it was noted that all planting should be completed within ten days at the latest.

Those present were Mayor J. M. Hughes, Aids J. W. Smith and R. G. Armstrong, Miss Wilhelmina Gordon, Miss Foster, R. F. Greenlees, M. R. Patterson and R. J. Rodger.

Red Triangle Fund Still Open.
Kingston, May 14.—(To the Editor): As chairman of the canvassing committee of the Red Triangle Fund, I want to thank the men who so ably assisted in this work and help our soldiers "over the top." To get at rest any doubt, I may say that all of those canvassers (about ninety) received absolutely no remuneration and gave liberally as well. The citizens as a whole contributed generally, but not all generously; and the houses to house canvassers were adopted to place the responsibility where it belonged, and not on the stores that are already overworked.

The original plan to publish all the names and amounts we had to abandon owing to scarcity of space, and only amounts appearing were given. We are having a list made of every donor, and this can be seen at the city treasurer's office. The canvass is not over yet. The books are still open. While the three days' effort was to raise the bulk of \$15,000, we are still taking subscriptions, and anyone who has been overlooked or out when the canvassers called can still help bring the fund up to the desired amount by sending their subscriptions to the honorary treasurer, W. H. Macneil.

BANANAS MAY BE SOLD BY THE POUND
High Prices May Force Local Dealers to Follow Other Cities.

One of the largest Italian wholesale fruit dealers stated on Tuesday that unless the price of bananas is lowered in the near future he will be forced to sell them by the pound instead of by the bunch. In Toronto and Winnipeg this step has been taken, and they are selling at seven cents a pound. At the present time it costs the wholesaler about six cents a pound to have the bananas laid down in his place of business, and the retail price will be above this.

Consumers have recognized in other cities that this is the fairest way to sell bananas when the price is so high. The sizes of the various grades of the fruit makes it imperative that the old method of selling them by the dozen be eliminated. It is expected that other commodities may soon be sold by the pound if the prices continue high. Already Sir George Foster has brought up the matter of selling eggs by the pound in the House of Commons, and "stirring innovations may arise from war time demands.

CITY COUNCIL'S TRIBUTE.

To the Memory of the Late Robert Meek.

The City Council paid tribute last night to the memory of the late Robert Meek by passing this resolution, which was moved by Ald. Newman and seconded by Ald. Couper: "That the council of the corporation of Kingston place on record its deep sense of the loss sustained by the city in the death of Robert Meek, and instructs the city clerk to forward a letter expressing sympathy and condolence to Mrs. Meek and family."

Ald. Newman added that Kingston had lost its first citizen by the death of Robert Meek, who was one of the most public spirited of men. The city was poorer indeed by the passing away of Mr. Meek. Ald. Couper said that words failed to express the sense of loss Kingston had sustained. Mr. Meek had raised the House of Refuge from a poor house to a comfortable home for the aged, and this institution was a monument to his memory.
