BANANAS MAY BE SOLD BY THE POUND

High Prices May Force Local Dealers to Follow Other

One of the largest Italian wholesale fruit dealers stated on Tuesday that unless the price of bananas is lowered in the near future he will be forced to sell them by the pound

instead of by the bunch.

In Toronto and Winnipeg this step has been taken, and they are selling at seven cents a pound. At the present time it costs the wholesaler In one pound sections, 25 cents each. about six cents a pound to have the bananas laid down in his place of juicy . . . . . 10c, 121/2c, 15c lb. business, and the retail price will be Evaporated Peaches, 2 lbs for 25c above this.
