### A MYSTERIOUS MAN PLACED UNDER ARREST

John Hargreaves Unable to Give a Clear Account of His Movements.

Who is the mysterious John Hargreaves, who has been loafing around Glenburnie, for the past couple of days? The man, so it is stated, has been sleeping in barns, has refused to eat, and has been acting in a very strange manner.
