HONORED THE OFFICERS INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

THE LIFE UNDERWRITERS DINED AT FRONTENAC CLUB.

It Was a Joyous Gathering—The Dominion Officers Made Admirable Addresses—Association Aims at High Ideals and Worthy Standards.

The local Life Underwriters' Association honored the president of the Dominion wide organization, J. T. Wilson, Halifax, and the general secretary, J. H. Castle Graham, Toronto, on their visit to Kingston on Tuesday by dining them at the Frontenac Club in the evening. It was a joyous gathering. About the table were many of Kingston's clever insurance advocates, and as guests were Mayor Hughes, Judge Lavell, U.S. Consul Johnson, William Cooke, president of the Board of Trade, Caterer Seager served a fine wartime spread, a few delicious courses, with coffee and cigars at its conclusion.

Elmer Woodman, president of the Kingston body, was chairman, and felicitously introduced the toasts and smartly and gracefully welcomed the visitors and guests. "The King" duly honored was followed by "The Corporation," offered in excellent terms by ex-Mayor R. D. Sutherland, and responded to by Mayor Hughes in a concise and well conceived speech, and by William Cooke, president of the Board of Trade, in happy form. Stephen Roughton proposed "The United States, Our Ally," in a rousing speech of appreciation of the loyalty and devotion of the Americans, now that they were in the war, and of respect and esteem for the republic's representative in Kingston. Col. Johnson was entertaining in his brief reply, in which he acknowledged the kind things said of his country, and returned the compliment by recalling the undying fame of Britishers and Canadians on the battle field and in the calmer walks of life.

M. G. Johnson, in effective words, toasted the "Life Underwriters' Association of Canada," an organization that had welded the field forces into a co-operating, forceful body, and had given standing and respect to the business. He eulogized the work of the president and the efficient and painstaking secretary. Presidents might come and go but all hoped Secretary Graham would go on endlessly inspiring and developing those engaged in life insurance work. Judge Lavell, in reply to W. J. Fair's highly eulogistic references of him, made a humorous speech that kept the table in roars of laughter. He concluded with words of cheer to the underwriters, whose work was laudable and decidedly helpful. His knowledge was that a vast number of his fellow citizens were insured for their bereaved friends when the dread summons came.

"The Press" was remembered and the National Anthem sung and a happy evening concluded.

AIKEN AND GALESPIE.

The Subjects of Questions by Members of Parliament.

Aiken to the military appeal tribunal at Brockville and elicited the reply that the appointment was authorized by the registrar for the district, as there was no other Brockville man available who was as generally valuable. There was no returned soldier on the list of the Portsmouth penitentiary on the complaint of a convict that he had used unbecoming language to him and had prevented him from performing work that another guard had ordered him to do.

Mr. Froulx asked questions with regard to Lieut.-Col. George H. Gillespie and elicited a reply from the Minister of Militia that Col. Gillespie holds the appointment of organizer and inspector of cadet corps in military district No. 3, and assists the general staff officer and D.A.A. and Q.M.G. at district headquarters when necessary. His pay and allowances are \$8.25 a day. The total amount received by him since the date of his appointment on the 1st of April, 1918, to 30th April, 1918, was \$18,468.20.

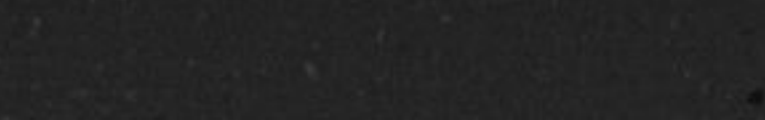
An announcement is made that Lieut. Col. L. W. May, instructor of military history, left the staff on April 30th.
