Military News

Last minute orders from the Ontario Registrar have been received by the exemption appeal tribunals giving absolute direction to exempt for the present all class B men of 20, 21 or 22 years of age. The order stated that the military request to re-consider these appeals was there-with withdrawn, and that the exemptions be allowed to stand.

Capt. Frank Mooney, in command of the 75th Battery, was advanced to a captaincy recently. He was overseas with the first contingent, was severely gassed and returned home after three years' service.

A new chaplain service is about to be organized for the different military districts throughout Canada. Plans are under consideration at Ottawa whereby every district will have a permanent staff of chaplains to look after the spiritual needs of the soldiers in each district. Fifty chaplains from all denominations are now being selected by Ottawa.

THE MINING SCHOOL WILL REMAIN OPEN

Official Denial That the Faculty Of Applied Science Would Close.

For some time reports have been in circulation, based apparently on excellent authority, that the faculty of applied science at Queen's University would not be re-opened next session owing to the largely diminished attendance that is anticipated. Principal R. Bruce Taylor was manifestly surprised on Tuesday morning when he was questioned regarding the matter. He denied the rumor absolutely, and stated that the matter had not even been discussed. He stated that an attendance of about fifty students would be present, and that there was no reason to believe that the mining school would be closed.

Given a Military Cross

Mrs. Ingledew received word this morning that her son, Driver William Denton, "A" Battery, R.C.H.A., had been awarded the Military Cross for his splendid work in saving the guns in the recent big drive. Gunner Denton left with the original "A" Battery in 1914 and has been on active service ever since, being twice wounded. He is now in Edmonton Military Hospital, London, England, suffering from wounds received on March 29th.

Major "Buzz" Benson receives the D.S.O., Capt. Huntley Macpherson and Lieut. Harold Brownfield the Military Cross and ten non-coms and men the Military Medal.
