

THERE WILL BE NO BARBERS' STRIKE A Compromise Agreement Was

Effected on Thursday Night. At a special meeting in the Trades and Labor Hall on Thursday evening

a compromise arrangement in the barbers' dispute was reached. The first demand of the journeymen barbers was that the shops should close at seven o'clock each evening, but this was firmly refused by the bosses, who wished the shops to remain open until eight o'clock. On Thursday evening, however, the boses agreed to lock up their shops at half past seven each evening during the months of June, July, August and September. As a result of the agreement there will be no strike by the Barbers' Union on June 1st, as was anticipated. In view of the circumstances, the arrangement seems satisfactory to both sides.
