## THE DANGERS OF SPEEDING

SOME MOTORISTS HAVE NO REGARD FOR OTHERS' RIGHTS.

A Disgrace That Automobiles Should Be Permitted to Dash Along the Paved Roadways.

Reiteration of the dangers of automobile speeding seem to be ineffective and severe penalties should be meted out by the police to those who are daily endangering the life of citizens on the streets of Kingston. Every season incessant and insistent complaints are made about the apparent lack of regard that motorists have for the rights of pedestrians. Certain young and inexperienced drivers, lacking entirely in that cool and collected temper which is so necessary on the busy streets, are striking terror into the hearts of parents who fear to allow their children on the streets. It is a public disgrace that automobiles should be permitted to race on the thoroughfares at a rate of speed which is neither necessary nor lawful.

Already several accidents have occurred as a result of reckless driving and more are certain to occur if instant action is not taken. The audacity of drivers in defying the law in broad daylight should stir the custodians of its mandates to action, and the maximum penalty would be too lenient to those who would endanger the lives and rights of other citizens.

Repetition of the dangers should be unnecessary if several of those who do not recognize the law were set up as an example to those who would follow in their lead. On the streets of Kingston fifteen miles an hour is fast enough for any motorist to carry out any errand that may be necessary, and drivers should be rigidly held to that speed. If they are not the law is set at defiance and may as well be evaded from the by-laws of the city, for it would be better for the citizens to see the cars going racing on the streets unchecked by any statute than for them to see the law openly disobeyed with no attempt made to punish the infractors.

Not only are there some motorists driving on the streets at excessive speeds, but when an accident does occur they refuse to return to the scene of the occurrence, and thus lay themselves open to a serious offence. On Thursday afternoon Gordon, the seven-year-old son of A. W. McMahon, Earl street, was severely bruised when struck by a car on Wellington street. His face was scraped and his clothes were torn off when the automobile threw him to the ground. Instead of returning to his assistance, the car drove on, and it remained for some passersby to take him to the office of Dr. I. G. Bogart to have his injuries dressed.

The paved streets of this city are regarded by motorists as speedways, and there should be rigorous supervision for the next few weeks until the law is recognized by those who now defy it.

## THERE WILL BE NO BARBERS' STRIKE

A Compromise Agreement Was Effected on Thursday Night.

At a special meeting in the Trades and Labor Hall on Thursday evening a compromise arrangement in the barbers' dispute was reached. The first demand of the journeymen barbers was that the shops should close at seven o'clock each evening, but this was firmly refused by the bosses, who wished the shops to remain open until eight o'clock. On Thursday evening, however, the bosses agreed to lock up their shops at half past seven each evening during the months of June, July, August and September. As a result of the agreement there will be no strike by the Barbers' Union on June 1st, as was anticipated. In view of the circumstances, the arrangement seems satisfactory to both sides.

## THERE'S A BIG DEMAND

For Identity Papers From American Consul Johnson.

Following the order published on Thursday that aliens who appear to be of military age must carry papers proving their nationality, the American consulate here has been flooded with applications for citizenship papers. Telegrams, letters and personal applications are being made, and the office staff is very busy busy making out the forms.

Aliens of other nationalities who have neglected to secure papers proving their identity are telegraphing for the documents from the offices of their respective consuls. There are still many Canadians who have not secured the necessary papers. Requests for birth, marriage or attested certificates are being received as it will be an offence after June 1st to be without papers giving reasons for not being in military service. All men of apparent military age should be provided with documents.
