## NO CRITICISM OF V.M.C.A.

MADE BY DELEGATES TO G.W.V.A. CONVENTION.

Everybody To Pay Entrance Fee To Celebration on July 1st—Street Car Tickets For Soldiers in Hospitals.

At a well-attended meeting of the G. W. V. A. Monday evening further arrangements were made for the celebration on July 1st. The president reported that preparations for the celebration were well under way. Chairman of the various committees have been named and splendid reports were presented from some of these chairmen. The secretary reported that he had interviewed General Helmer, Brig.-Gen. W. St. Pierre Hughes, D.S.O., and the Dominion secretary-treasurer. All three were most enthusiastic over the celebration, and stated that they would be happy to attend.

The president reported that \$25 worth of free street car tickets had been given to each of the three hospitals—Queen's, Mowat and Osgood. A resolution of thanks was moved to H. C. Nickle. It was decided that every one, including returned soldiers, should pay an entrance fee on July 1st, but that a certain number of free tickets should be placed at the disposal of the S. hospitals for free distribution. Comrade Bailey gave notice of motion that during July and August only one meeting a month be held. Comrade Bowker gave notice of motion that the Dominion Executive be asked to institute the referendum system of government.

A very interesting report on the Hamilton Convention was given by Comrades Connor and Bowker. The local delegates took no part in the discussion in which the Y. M. C. A. was condemned, as it was felt that the Y. M. C. A. has done and is doing good work for their comrades in France, and ought not at this time to be kicked, but should rather be boosted.

## Military News

Orders have been sent out by the Military Services Council to registrars not to call up any more "B" class men. All that are needed for the present have been secured. Additional calls should will be made in the future as they are required.

General Maunsell, D.S.O., M.D. No. 3, is one of the board of examiners of candidates to the R.M.C. He went to Ottawa yesterday.

Nursing Sister M. Reveller has been appointed to the Military Hospital, Cobourg, and Nursing Sister B. Wesley has been appointed to the Osgood Hospital, Kingston.

G. S. M., C. D. Sucee and C. S. M. J. Andrews are transferred from Kingston to Brockville for duty with the Engineer Depot.

C. S. M. Dawes and C. S. M. Sharpe are returned to duty at Kingston from Brockville.

Capt. D. C. Dick has been appointed to command the 65th Depot Battery vice Major J. H. Evans.

Lieut. A. McEachern and E. Vincent Mullen have been appointed to the 1st Depot Battalion.

Lieut. G. F. Newlands has been struck off the strength of the C.E.F. as being medically unfit.

Capt. T. S. H. Abell, late 2nd Battalion, is permitted to resign.

Capt. J. R. Parker is detailed for duty with the British-Canadian recruiting mission, New York branch.

Lieut. L. M. Wedd is detailed for duty in the branch of the Director of Records, Ottawa.

The A. P. M. at Kingston has wired the chief of police at Lindsay to apprehend Lieut. George Willis Elliott, Middlesex Regiment. No charge is stated, and enquiry here failed to elicit any information except that the request to make the arrest had been sent.

The increasing number of men under canvas at Barrfield camp is having a good effect on the pockets of the taxi-drivers of the city. When the 1,200 draftees came in on June 1st the road was black with cars of every description and policemen were necessary to control the traffic. If the camp continues to grow, there may be a recurrence of the conditions of the summer of 1916, when hundreds of taxi-drivers spent all of their time on the Kingston-Barrfield road.

On Tuesday, F. Preston Fitzgerald, Ottawa, took charge of the audit branch of Military District No. 3, at the Armouries. Hitherto this branch has been under the supervision of Major Turner, of the paymasters' department, but it has now been formed into a district unit. Mr. Fitzgerald is a captain in the Imperial army, and has seen service in a number of campaigns, including the present war. He is bringing several clerks from Ottawa with him, and H. R. Rogers, H. W. Shaw, A. Webster and W. McCalfe, of the local staff, are being transferred to his department. New quarters for the audit branch will be secured shortly.

## SYDNEY BROWN FOUND DEAD IN A HAYLOFT

### Death Due to Heart Failure—The Deceased Was a Teamster.

On Tuesday morning about ten o'clock the remains of Sydney Brown, 14 Markland street, were found in W. B. Dalton & Son's hayloft by Percy Johnston, Pembroke street, one of the employees.

Mr. Brown, who was a teamster for the firm, left his home early on Monday morning to feed the horses, and he was not seen again until his body was found in the loft. It is presumed that he went to the barn to get some hay, and was seized with a faint spell.

None of the employees saw him on Monday, as it was a holiday, but the coroner, Dr. W. W. Sands, stated that he was confident that death was due to heart failure, and that he had been dead at least twenty hours.

Constables Cotter and Downey were summoned as soon as the body was found, and the remains were transferred to Corbett's undertaking parlors. It was decided that an inquest would be unnecessary.

It is rather a peculiar coincidence that the deceased's brother, John Brown, passed away over two years ago in very similar circumstances. He died in the bath at the Albion Hotel, death being due to heart failure.

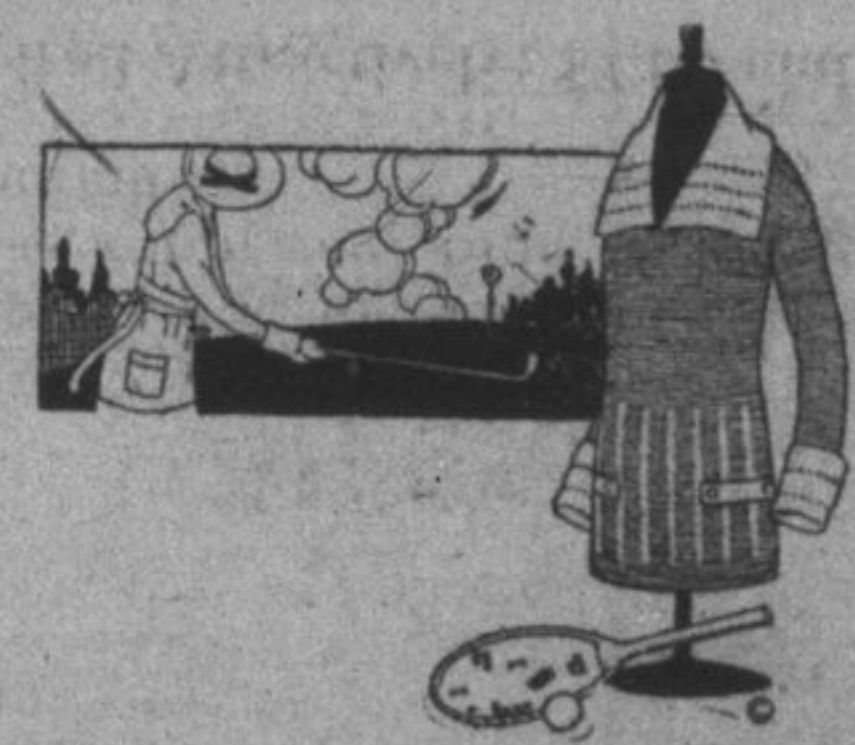
