**ARRIVES AT PENITENTIARY INCIDENTS OF THE DAY**

**"VENUS" COTE DRESSED AND WORKED AS A MAN.**

The Prison No Place For a Young Woman of Her Caliber—Women's Organization Should Secure Her Release.

"Venus" Cote, the sturdy Rimouski, Que., lass of twenty-three who was a few days ago sentenced to a term of two years in penitentiary because she posed as a man, had her hair cut in military style and went as far as donning man's attire and working in the log driving bee for the Chaleur Bay Pulp Company at Restigouche, is now in the Paris-mouth penitentiary women's ward. She was brought here in male attire and the prison authorities did not know with whom they were dealing until they read the commitment. The young woman escaped from the jail at Rimouski and was finally located, half-starved, by a sheriff's posse.

Indignation is expressed at the treatment accorded this over breaking an old law which says it is an offence for a woman to don male garments. They have made changes and women are everywhere wearing male attire at work. The general opinion is that the penitentiary is no place for "Venus" Cote, who showed bravery and enterprise in helping in a national industry. If the women organizations of Kingston and other places do not secure her immediate release and give her aid, the Whig will be much surprised.

**JUSTICE METED OUT TO TWO FIREBUGS**

**Hilton and Robert Green, Bedford Mills, Sentenced to Penitentiary.**

On Wednesday the little hamlet of Bedford Mills, near Newboro, had a sensation that will long be remembered by the residents of the locality.

A fire inquest, capture, trial and conviction of two bad criminals all in one afternoon is a rare experience for a quiet neighborhood, but that is what actually happened in the little village.

Following the burning of the summer cottages of Messrs. Bilton and Wrathall, of Newboro; Wright, of Brockville, and Ashe, of New York, during the week of May 18th-25th, Inspector A. B. Boyd, of the provincial police, visited the scene and quietly secured sufficient evidence to warrant the holding of a fire inquest. This was held Wednesday and was presided over by Superintendent Joseph Rogers, head of the provincial police.

As a result of the clever work of Inspector Boyd, Hilton Green and Robert Green, aged about 40 years, both residents of that locality, were tried and sentenced to Portsmouth penitentiary for terms of ten and two years respectively, the former for arson and the latter on a charge of theft.

As a motive for firing the cottages one of the prisoners is reported to have stated after receiving sentence that the cottages and presence of campers at the lake interfered with his customs of illegal fishing.

**Late Major Thomas Kelly.**

Major Thomas Kelly died at his residence, 537 MacLaren street, Ottawa, on Wednesday, after a month's illness. He was seasonal clerk in the House of Commons for the last thirty-three years, which position he held till he took ill. He was born in Portsmouth, Ont., seventy years ago. In 1885 he went west with the Middle West Battalion for the North-West rebellion. He was promoted to the rank of major on the field. Until eight years ago he was paymaster of the 47th Regiment of Kingston. The late Major Kelly is survived by his wife, three daughters, Olive, Florence and Susan, all at home, and two real and Mrs. J. McLaughlin, Toronto. He was an Anglican and attended St. John's church.
