No Criminal Cases For Court.

Belleville, June 6.—Acting on a suggestion from the attorney-general of the province, Judge Denison has ordered the cancellation of the grand jury and petit jury, so there will be no criminal or jury cases tried at the county court and general sessions to be held in this city next week.
