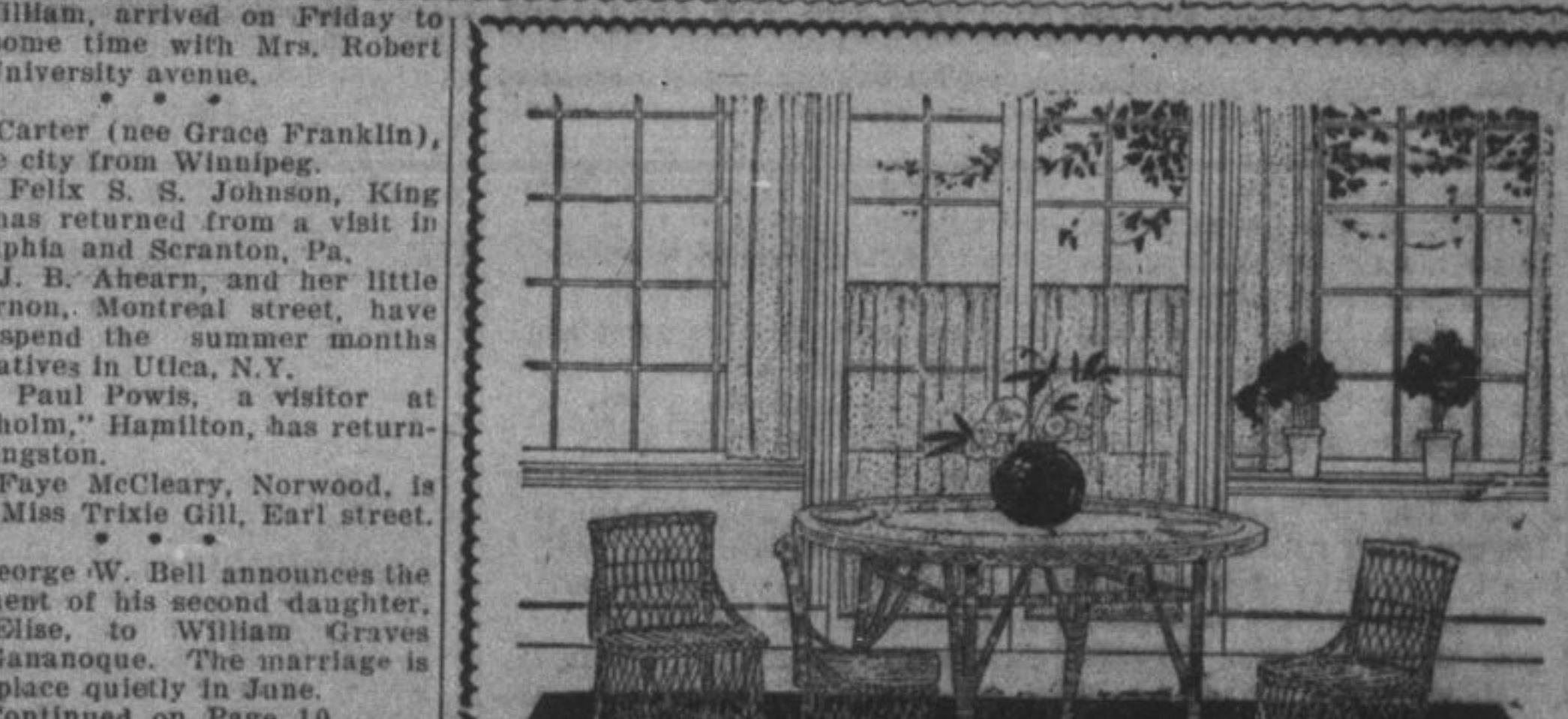

COOL, A. E. ROSS WRITES To the Ross Club Praising Their Good Work.

The secretary of the Ross Club received the following interesting letter from Col. Arthur E. Ross, C.B., dated May 5th, 1918:

"Dear Friends: I have just received your letter which I read in March. I feel greatly honored in seeing my name used by you for such a good purpose. Any work you can do for the Red Cross does much good. Every little piece of work you do adds to the comfort of some soldier. There are some mean-spirited people who say Red Cross supplies are sold or misused. Do not believe a word of it. We have failed to find any proof of it. From front to base hospital your work is freely given. I thank you for the honor. I praise your zeal and urge you to work. The men appreciate and the medical officers and nurses are very enthusiastic of the aid they get from Red Cross. Sincerely yours, A. E. Ross."

Await Bank Dividend.

Creditors of the Cape Vincent Bank, which failed three years ago and was taken over by the State Banking Department, are awaiting a second dividend and various reports as to its amount are in circulation. Around Cape Vincent it is asserted the second dividend will be 25 per cent, and that it will soon be forthcoming. The bank was a private institution and depositors brought several proceedings to determine the amount of their claims in Supreme Court.
