**MORE MOTORISTS IN COURT INCIDENTS OF THE DAY**

MAGISTRATE FARRELL SAYS PUBLIC MUST BE PROTECTED.

Several Lads Up For Truancy Were Warned That They Must Attend School and Are Allowed Out on Probation.
