RENFREW LOSES FACTORY.

T. A. Low's New Works Will Be Located in Peterboro.

Renfrew, June 13.—Contrary to expectation Mr. T. A. Low's new munitions factory will not be located in Renfrew. Because of the urgency of the large contract secured by Mr. Low, the question of ample electrical power, housing conditions and adequate labor had to be immediately considered by Mr. Low. So far as power was concerned, Renfrew was prepared to meet Mr. Low. Meantime, he had received a pressing invitation to take over a war factory in Peterboro, already built and ready for occupation. He has made a personal investigation of the inducements offered by Peterboro, and has decided to locate his new factory there.

Lieut. J. McArthur, who left Renfrew two years ago as head of the Renfrew company of the 130th Battalion, is home on furlough. He was severely wounded at the front last February, and is now in his pocket a German souvenir in the shape of a bullet extracted from his body. He expresses the utmost confidence regarding a complete Allied victory, and that within a short time, home and property here some four or five months ago to T. Low, and has since resided with his family in Toronto, is again to become a resident of Renfrew, having the other day purchased the fine residence and property of John Allan on Horton street.

VIOLATED A CITY BY-LAW

JUDGE LAVELL FINED W. F. NICKLE FOR CUTTING CORNER.

Case Was Threshed Out in the Police Court on Saturday Morning—Three Other Autoists Were Also Fined—A Drunk Claims He Was Poisoned.

Judge Lavell presided at the police court Saturday morning for the hearing in the case against W. F. Nickle, M.P., who was summoned for a breach of the city by-law in cutting the corner of Brock and King street with his auto on Saturday morning last, between 10 and 10.15 o'clock. After hearing all the evidence, and the argument of the "prisoner at the bar," who conducted his own case, His Honor imposed the usual fine of \$5 and costs. J. L. Whiting, city solicitor, appeared on behalf of the prosecution.

The charge was laid by Constables James Downey and Thomas Mullinger, and they told how Mr. Nickle came down Brock street with his auto and cut the Bank of Toronto corner. They charged that Mr. Nickle drove within four feet of the curb.

Mr. Nickle, giving evidence on his own behalf, stated that when he came down Brock street he was on his way to the garage. He came down the right side of the street about four or five feet from the curb. As he approached the Bank of Commerce crossing he found an auto stopped there. The car was faced towards the east, and across the crossing. Witness turned to the left, and then to the right, with the intention of complying with the city by-laws, but as he did so, a wagon came up from behind, in the middle of the road. He was sure he did not go within 20 or 25 feet of the curb at the Bank of Toronto. If his car could be placed within four feet of the curb he would plead guilty. He turned towards the left, in order to avoid an accident.

Judge Lavell, in imposing the fine, held that the accused was not justified in committing the breach of the by-law as he did. It was the duty of the accused to have stopped his car behind the wagon, coming from behind, which would have had to stop. However, he did not regard his driving as reckless.

Mr. Nickle said that after the incident occurred, he expressed the wish that he would be summoned, as he wished to have a test case.

Major Roy Richardson, John Gibson, and Peter Cranger, paid the usual fine for violations of the rules of the road with their autos.

Magistrate Farrell, who heard these cases, took occasion to remark on the pedestrians had the right of way on the roads.

Kenneth Fraser admitted being intoxicated, and was fined \$10 and costs. He does not know the name of the man who gave him the liquor, but said he was very anxious to locate him, as he claimed it was poison he had been given. The police will assist the thirsty soldier in his search for the man. Fraser paid \$2.50 for half a bottle of booze.

WON RACE WITH STORM. Flyer Overtook and Outdistanced Thunder Clouds. New York, June 15.—In a victorious race with a thunderstorm, Lieutenant Culver yesterday broke the old post record between Philadelphia and New York. He left Philadelphia at 2.30 and arrived at Belmont Park 42 minutes later, flying at the rate of 147 miles an hour. Trenton, the flyer overtook a thunderstorm moving in the same direction. Passing through it he beat the rain into Belmont Park half an hour. He flew an airplane equipped with a Liberty motor.

TO DO RESEARCH WORK. Prof. A. L. Clarke Will Be Attached to American Signal Corps. Prof. Arthur L. Clark, professor of physics at Queen's University, is leaving for Washington, D.C., where he will be engaged during the summer in research work for the signal corps of the American army. IN WAR TO THE END; END OF WAR LORD

Asquith Says That Nothing Can Weaken People's Steadfast Purpose.

London, June 15.—"We have reached the stage where more is to be gained than lost by laying before the people all the actualities," declared Herbert Asquith, former Premier, in speaking before the Aldwych Club yesterday. "The people are ready to face any situation."

"The tide of the invasion has not yet been stemmed, and it would be folly to make any forecast of the impending movements, but whatever the issue of this phase it will not weaken our allegiance to the great purposes for which we are fighting."

Mr. Asquith evoked cheering when in speaking of the strain of the present period, he said that his afforded opportunities for the "cruder forms of sensuality mongering, which found a ready market among people of low intelligence and high credulity."

DRAFT EVADERS CAUGHT

Detroit Police Raided Meeting Making 210 Arrests.

Detroit, Mich., June 15.—Two hundred and ten arrests of men of military age and draft evaders were made last night in a police raid upon a meeting at which John Reed, named by the Bolshevik Government as one of its representatives in the United States, was the speaker. It was announced today. The arrests were made at the close of the meeting each man being stopped and requested to show his draft classification card. Reed declared that recognition by the Allies, especially America, is a military expedient necessary to prevent the Soviet from crumbling.

KERENSKY IN NORWAY.

Former Russian Minister Says He Is Trying to Reach France.

A Pacific-Port, June 15.—A. Kononov, former Russian Minister of Commerce, who is here on his way to Washington, London and Paris, said that former Premier Alexander Kerensky is on his way to France. Kononov served as Minister during Kerensky's administration, and for a time was vice-president of the Cabinet. He was vice-president of the Duma during the Romanoff rule.

"The last I heard from Kerensky was through an indirect source," he said today. "At that time he was in Norway and was trying to reach France."
