Mountain Grove, June 17.—A wedding of interest to many took place on Wednesday, June 17th, at high noon, at the home of the bride's mother, "Maple Grove," when Eva Rebecca, fifth daughter of the late Matthew W. Price and Mrs. Price, was married to Eugene F. Smith of Toronto.

After the ceremony a dainty luncheon was served. At three o'clock the bridal pair were motored to Mountain Grove station by James McDonald, and left for points east.

The groom is a returned soldier of the second Battalion, Saskatchewan, having served seventeen months in the trenches, where he received thirteen wounds and suffered from gas attacks. He was invalided home in September, 1917, and received his honorable discharge from the army.

After spending a short time with friends here, Mr. and Mrs. Smith will go to Toronto where they will reside. They will be at home to their friends at 48 Greenlaw avenue, after July 1st.

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STRIKE AT DAVIS' TANNERY

OVER THE DISCHARGING OF FIVE UNION EMPLOYEES.

Forty-seven on Strike—Twenty Men Operating the Plant, of Whom Twelve Are Alleged to be Enemy Aliens.

On Monday afternoon, according to officials of the Tanners' Union, five men in the employment of A. Davis & Sons, tanners, were discharged without any reason except the statement that the company was not getting value for its money.

On April 27th J. Kennedy was dismissed by Harold Davis, and Kennedy sought the assistance of the Trades and Labor Council. He alleged that he was dismissed for his activity in forming a union among his fellow workmen.

Representations were made to Captain J. G. McLeod, Ottawa, and the Minister of Labor, acting under the provisions of the statutes for the prevention of strikes, requested that the matter be submitted to arbitration.

A Davis & Sons consented, and appointed J. L. Whittier, K.C., to represent them. The Allied Trades appointed Thomas Moore and these two selected a third member in the person of Judge Gunn, Ottawa, county judge for Carleton.

The board met at Kingston on June 2nd and heard evidence. Before taking evidence the chairmen advised an amicable settlement, but Elmer Davis, president of the company, said he would not discuss his business with a committee or union.
