THE LATE LT.-COL. CLYDE

A WELL-KNOWN RESIDENT OF
ODESSA PASSES AWAY.

Served in North-west Mounted Police
Under Col. (Now Lord) French—
Did Duty in Fenian Raid of 1870.

Death claimed a military man of long standing in the district, when Lieut.-Col. Thomas Clyde passed away at his home in Odessa Wednesday morning at ten o'clock. The late Col. Clyde had been ailing for the past year, but has been confined to his home for the past six weeks. He was an outstanding figure in the county for many years, and his passing is a source of deep regret to his many friends in the city and county.

The late Col. Clyde was born in the County of Huntington, Quebec, on January 15th, 1853. He came to Upper Canada when quite a child with his parents, and settled on the farm known as the Brock Farm, near the Perth Road. Afterwards the farm near Cataragui was purchased, and Col. Clyde remained at home with his parents until 1869, when he took a course in the military school which was conducted under the regular R.C.R. He obtained a first-class certificate, and afterwards joined the 1st Frontenac Cavalry under command of Major Duff. He next took a course in the cavalry school, again securing a first-class certificate and was taken on the staff of the school of instruction for the balance of the term.

He was on duty during the Fenian raid in 1870, and received a medal for that service. In 1873 he joined the North-West Mounted Police, which was organized under Col. French (now Field Marshal French). In the north-west he had untold hardships to endure during the long march across the plains to the Rockies. He was one of the mounted police who helped to build the original Fort MacLeod and Fort Calgary, holding the rank of sergeant-major, or senior staff constable. He came home on the completion of his term of service and purchased a farm in the township of Ernestown, County of Lennox. Some few years afterwards he was solicited strongly to take a commission in the 4th Hussars, which he accepted as first lieutenant. He afterwards held the position of adjutant for three years, and succeeded Capt. Griffith to the command of "B" squadron, later being appointed lieutenant-colonel commanding the 4th Hussars. His last military office was that of brigadier-general of the cavalry camp at Barriefield previous to the transfer of the camp to Petawawa.

The late Col. Clyde was also a justice of the peace for the counties of Lennox and Addington, and was a member of the municipal council of the township of Ernestown. Throughout his life he maintained that kind, genial nature which made him beloved by the men under his command, and his death creates a void which will be indeed hard to fill.

He leaves to mourn his loss his widow, who resides in Odessa, two sons, Elmer, on the old homestead, and Courtland, of this city, and three daughters, Mrs. H. Kendall, of Montreal, Florence of the British Whig staff, and Nellie at home.

The funeral will be held from his late residence, Odessa, at Cataragui cemetery, on Friday afternoon at one o'clock.

TALKING IT OVER.

The Tanners Are Putting Case Up To the Executive.

The members of the Tanners' Union met Tuesday afternoon and again on Wednesday to consider the situation that has developed. They regard the action of A. Davis & Sons as an attempt to destroy their organization and communication of the matter to the executive body apprising it of what has taken place. To-night there will be a general meeting of all the trades of the city.

The following is a copy of a contract between the firm and one of its employees:

"I agree to serve the firm of A. Davis & Sons, Ltd., under the following conditions, namely, as fireman, under the direction of Robert Vecchi, to be paid from this date at the rate of thirty-five cents per hour for a twelve-hour day or night shift. It is further understood that I shall not object to firing hard coal screenings or wood refuse in season in quantities according to the power required. I agree to discharge the duties required of me in accordance with the instructions of the said firm or the instructions of those whom they appoint. I further agree that the said firm shall withhold \$4.20 per week for the period of thirteen weeks from by wages, which they shall hold as a guarantee of good faith on my part and which shall not be due or payable until the completion of this contract."

The contract does not stipulate any period of service. The firm insisted upon this agreement as a condition of employment. Upon inquiry it was stated by the workmen that they receive from \$20 to \$25 per week, but wages was not a cause of dissatisfaction. No petition had ever been presented to the firm on the subject of wages or hours of labor, although the long hours demanded of them was a cause of grievance among them, and it was the apprehension of the firm that caused it to take the action it did in dismissing the employees for forming a union. This, at all events, is the impression created among the men. No dissatisfaction respecting their output was expressed.

When interviewed on Wednesday Elmer Davis stated that the firm's business was running as usual. The statement that only twenty men were left to operate his plant was not correct, as there are sixty-five men at work, and two of those who left in sympathy with the strikers have since returned to their work. The men who were dismissed were causing dissatisfaction and their services were dispensed with. No petition of grievances had ever been presented to him respecting wages or hours of labor. The output of the plant is one thousand and hides per day, and up to the first of the year it was running at full capacity, but since then there has been a reduction in output, but not an appreciable reduction. The men did some picketing, but no-

thing disorderly has transpired up to the present time. Mr. Davis says that there are less than thirty men on strike out of a staff of one hundred.
