BOAT HAS STICKY CARGO

CONSISTED OF 100,000 GALLONS OF MOLASSES.

To Be Used For Munitions—Molasses of the Rich Black New Orleans Variety, Goes to Belleville, Ont.

The Oswego, N.Y., Palladium says: For the first time in the history of commerce at this port a cargo of 102,000 gallons of molasses came here in bulk Saturday night about 7 p.m. It was loaded in New York and is going to Belleville, Ont., to the Cobylville Distilling Company, where it is to be used in the making of munitions for the allied armies.

The powerboat Louise, driven by a 100 horsepower gas engine, has in tow the scow American Boy No. 3. Louise has carried sugar and molasses between the West Indies and Atlantic Gulf ports. There are four large tanks of white pine in her hold and in these 62,000 gallons is carried. It is the thick, black old New Orleans variety. Captain Charles V. Griffin, the master says, and is worth from 90 cents to \$1 a gallon, so the cargo is worth from \$90,000 to \$100,000.

There are four large tanks of iron on the deck of the barge American Boy No. 3 and these contain 40,000 gallons. It is unloaded by a siphon system augmented by an air pressure maintained on the tanks.

The Louise came through the barge canal drawing ten feet of water and never touched bottom but once, near Little Falls, and then only as the boat was carried out of the channel. He regards it as the equal of the Panama, and other large canals in Europe, through which, as a deep water sailor, he has passed. A year ago Captain Griffin commanded the four-masted schooner Carl F. Cressy, of Boston. She was the first American bottom to take a cargo of sugar into France after the United States had declared war on Germany. Returning in ballast to this country he encountered a German U-boat and the Cressy was sunk and the crew spent two days in the lifeboat before being picked up by an outgoing French bark.

The Sugar Products Company of New York, has a contract to furnish 20,000,000 gallons of molasses to the Corbyville Distilling Company. All of it is coming via Oswego and it will take at least two seasons to fill the contract. Besides there is a large amount of sugar that will go over the same route to Canadian lake ports.

OGDENSBURG TO WITNESS

"OVER THE TOP" PUT ON BY KINGSTON VETERANS.

Arrangements Are Completed Whereby This Big Event Will Be Seen in the American River City.

The Great War Veterans have been invited to put on "Over the Top" at Ogdensburg, N.Y., on July 4th. The invitation was forwarded to Brig.-Gen. Hemming, who has signified his approval. The question of expenses, it is understood, has been satisfactorily arranged, and a large number of the veterans of the great war will participate in the celebration of the "Glorious 4th" at Ogdensburg.

"Over the Top" promises to be a dramatic event, and it will attract the whole city of Kingston to the fair grounds on the evening of July 4th. As stated before the trenches will present a replica of the front line. They will be manned in the same way by the same men. The rattle of rifle and machine-gun fire, the barrage of bombs, and the rush of the men forward to the attack will be as real as it is possible to make it. No wonder the Americans at Ogdensburg have sent such a pressing invitation to our veterans. They want to see real veterans and something of the real conditions of modern warfare.

The members of the grounds committee are at work at the fair grounds every day. Captain Edwards is in charge of the battle scene, and will be in command of the attachment in which 200 veterans will take part.

FIRE IN GALLEY OF A STEAMER

Little Damage Done Owing to the Quick Response of the Brigade.

The fire brigade had a call on Friday morning from James Swift & Co's wharf. The hose cart, hook and ladder wagon and motor cart made a record time in response. The fire was in the galley of the S.S. Omaha, 1,200 tons, owned by the Beaver Steamship Co., of Montreal. The hose was coupled to the hydrant on Ontario street and run down the wharf to the vessel and in less than fifteen minutes the fire was extinguished. The damage is reported to be very slight.

The Omaha, commanded by Captain Leany, was chartered by the Canada Steamship Lines to carry soft coal from Lake Erie to Montreal. She has made five trips this season, and on her way up this morning encountered such a heavy sea that it was not considered advisable to proceed with her limited power and the wharf was made at 5.30 a.m. There was no fire in the cook house at that time. The crew are all French-Canadians.

Did Not Stop Here.
The report that Lieut. Fichaire, who was making an aeroplane trip from Montreal to Cleveland, had landed at Barrie is erroneous. His statement also shows that he was not bound for Washington, and that report that he had made the trip of 170 miles from Montreal to Kingston in 90 minutes is disputed. Moreover he did not leave Montreal until 11.20 a.m., while the report had it that he was in Kingston at 11.15 a.m.

Addressed the Boys.
At the closing exercises of Trinity College School at Port Hope Col. G. N. Perron, R.M.C., presented the certificates, trophies and prizes of the year, and addressed the boys briefly on the subject of manliness. Mrs. Perron handed to the winners of athletic events the challenge cups.

A man who recently served six months in jail for selling liquor without a license was given a warm time by the police on Thursday. He had \$163 in a local bank, and it is stated that on coming out of jail he drew \$30, and later on went back to draw the remainder of his windfall. Through some mistake the bank paid him the full amount of his account, namely \$163, but when the mistake was discovered a search was made for the man. He was rounded up by the police, but denied that he had been overpaid. He was searched at the police station, and was found to be carrying a big wad at that time. Later on, when confronted with the lady in the bank who made the transaction the man finally admitted that he had been overpaid, and handed over the \$50 and he was given his liberty.

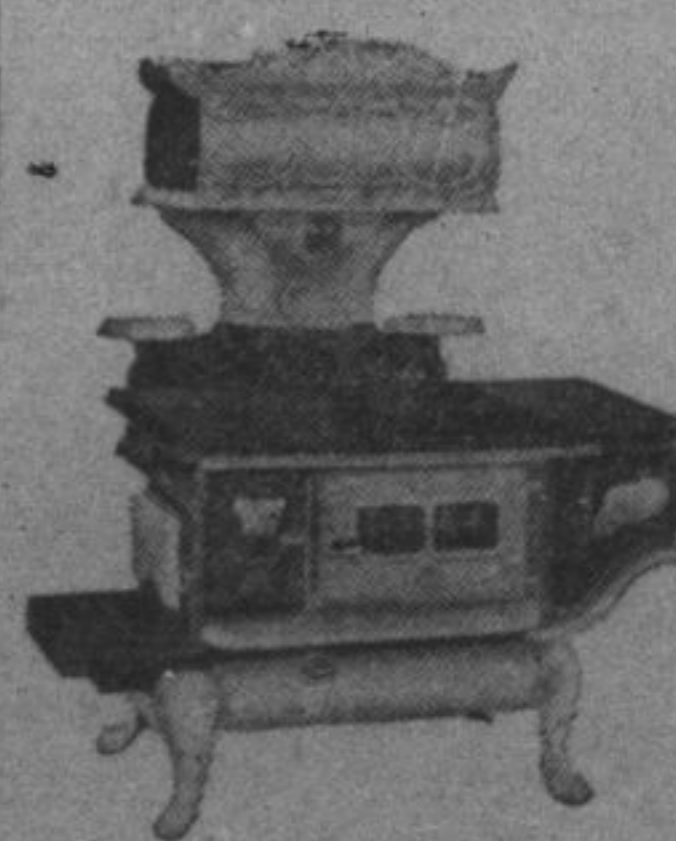
