Watch For Blister Beetles.

Blister beetles occur almost every year and cause considerable anxiety to farmers and gardeners from their habit of appearing suddenly in large numbers and feeding on potatoes, beans, beets, carrots, corn, tomatoes and other vegetables. They are soft-bodied insects—slender and cylindrical, and about half an inch in length. Spraying with Paris, Green or arsenate of lead, as is done for the potato beetle, will control blister beetles, but in some outbreaks it may be necessary to repeat the application because the beetles which are killed are soon replaced by others. In gardens many of the insects may be destroyed by beating them from the plants into a pan containing water with a little coal-oil on the surface.
