Tidings From All Over Told in a Pithy and Pointed Way.

Labor is urgently needed to increase the cut of spruce in British Columbia for aeroplane construction.

The fuel problem at Windsor, Ont., and other border municipalities is more critical than generally realized.

The northern district of Montreal has succeeded from the Quebec Provincial Women's Christian Temperance Union.

The largest hydraulic power system in Europe is to be built in Bavaria and operated as a public utility.

The Dominion Government may have to appoint another Deputy Minister of Soldiers' Re-establishment.

Waterloo County Council has started a movement among municipalities to economize in Government costs throughout the province.

For at least six weeks, says the Vienna Neue Freie Presse, the people of Austria will have to exist on little more than salads and certain vegetables.

A renewal for five years of the general arbitration treaty between the United States and Great Britain has been approved by the Senate at Washington.

A total of \$129,812.50 must be raised by Brant county this year, exclusive of the Provincial war tax. Of this sum, \$96,010 must come through taxes.

Thomas S. Hudson, Montreal, grand master, was unanimously elected at the Grand Lodge of the Canadian Order of Oddfellows, meeting in Hamilton.

William Varley has been mentioned as a possible labor party candidate in North-east Toronto to contest the election of Hon. Dr. H. J. Cody, Minister of Education.

Eight hundred and thirty-five German aeroplanes have been destroyed by the French since January 1st, according to an official statement.

Dr. Valentine Mott, traveller and surgeon, who was one of the early exponents in the United States of the Pasteur treatment for hydrophobia, is dead at New York.

Convicted by Federal Jury. New York, June 21.—Joseph F. Catherford, and seven other defendants, followers of the late "Pastor" Russell, were found guilty of conspiring to violate the espionage law by a jury in federal court last night.

HAS ARRIVED HOME.

A Soldier Thought Dead Startles His Sister.

Pembroke, Mass., June 21.—Howard G. Leighton, recently mentioned in a Canadian casualty list as having died on a battlefield in France, started his sister, Mrs. William C. Leighton, by appearing at her home here today.

"I thought you were dead," was the sister's greeting.

"I thought so myself," the soldier replied.

Leighton, who enlisted at Boston with a Canadian regiment, said he was so badly gassed in battle that he was pronounced dead, and the body ordered removed for burial.

He was being taken away stretcher-bearers noticed signs of life, he said, and took him to a hospital, where he recovered. Notice of his death was conveyed to his family in March.

ALL UNDER LICENSE. United States Stock Yards and Associated Dealers.

Washington, June 21.—All stock yards in the United States to-day were ordered by President Wilson to be put under Federal license.

A Presidential proclamation was issued, which requires that licenses must be obtained from the food administration on or before July 26th.

Licensing as is required of commission men, order-buyers, traders, speculators and scalpers handling or dealing in live cattle, sheep, swine or goats, "in or in connection with such stockyards," except those exempted by the food and fuel law.

Dean Weldon on Titles. Dean Weldon, of Manchester, formerly head master of Harrow, writes to the Manchester Guardian: "It is slightly surprising that the protest against hereditary titles should come in the first instance from Canada because Australia and New Zealand are probably still more democratic in sentiment."

My general experience is that there is a widespread feeling beyond the seas that hereditary titles and still more hereditary legislative powers are incompatible with democracy.

The feeling is intensified by the suspicion to which evidence at home has recently afforded color, that titles may tend to become a scarcely less effective means of corrupt political influence than bribery openly given in the time of Walpole.

Turn to the Right. New Brunswick recently changed the rule of the road, when the Legislature adopted the Highway Bill containing a provision for turning to the right.

Cape Vincent, N.Y., school will have a class day and commencement exercises on June 24th and 25th. Twelve students are to be graduated.

Gov. Victor Williams is in England, and will return to Canada soon.

Brave Aviators Honored.

Lieut. Stanley Rosevear, belonging to Port Arthur, has been awarded a bar to his Distinguished Service Cross for attacking, on March 15th, eight aircraft, destroying two.

The official statement reads: "This officer very skillful and a dashing fighting pilot." Rosevear was awarded the cross in November, mention being made of his attacking at a height of only a hundred feet.

Writing home, he said he could not tell what an awful hell the barrage is, "I cannot at times hear my own engine or machine gun."

Flight-Lieut. Cecil Darley, formerly a pupil at the Curtiss School, Toronto, from Lachine, Que., also receives a bar to the cross for night bombing raids of docks and air-dromes.

He received the cross in August for gallantry in bringing home his machine under difficulties after bombing Bruges.

Military Service Act, 1917.

Men 19 and 20 Years of Age. Harvest Leave.

Leave of Absence on Ground of Extreme Hardship. Procedure to obtain Leave of Absence.

Men Nineteen and Twenty Years of Age.

It has come to the attention of the Government that there is a widespread impression that young men of nineteen years, and those who became twenty since October 13, 1917, as well as those who may become nineteen from time to time and who have been or will be called upon to register under the Military Service Act, are to be immediately called to the colours.

This impression is quite incorrect. No date has yet been fixed for calling upon such men to go report for duty, nor has the question been brought before the Cabinet for decision. In view of the need of labour on the farm, it is most unlikely that consideration will be given to the matter until after the harvest is over, although of course the Government's action must be determined primarily by the military situation.

There is no further obligation incumbent upon young men of the ages above mentioned who have registered or who do so hereafter, until they receive notice from the Registrars.

Harvest Leave. Some enquiries have been received as to the possibility of granting harvest leave to such troops as may be in the country at that time. No definite assurance can be given on this point as advantage must be taken of ships as they become available. On the other hand, harvest leave will be given if at all possible.

Leave of Absence on Grounds of Extreme Hardship. It is desired that the Regulations respecting leave of absence in cases of hardship should be widely known and fully understood. Such leave will be granted in two cases:— (a) where extreme hardship arises by reason of the fact that the man concerned is either the only son capable of earning a livelihood, of a father killed or disabled on service or presently in service overseas, or in training for such service, or under treatment after returning from overseas; or the only remaining of two or more brothers capable of earning a livelihood (the other brother or brothers having been killed or disabled on service, or being presently in service overseas, or in training for overseas or under treatment after his or their return from overseas); brothers married before 4th August, 1914, living in separate establishments and having a child or children not to be counted, in determining the fact that the man is the "only" remaining son or brother;

(b) where extreme hardship arises by reason of exceptional circumstances such as the fact that the man concerned is the sole support of a widowed mother, an invalid father or other helpless dependents.

It is to be noted that in all these cases the governing factor is not hardship, loss or suffering to the individual concerned, but to others, that is, members of his family or those depending upon him.

Procedure to obtain leave of absence. A simple system for dealing with these cases has been adopted. Forms of application have been supplied to every Depot Battalion and an officer of each battalion has been detailed whose duty it is to give them immediate attention. The man concerned should on reporting to his unit state that he desires to apply for leave of absence on one or more of the grounds mentioned and his application form will then be filled out and forwarded to Militia Headquarters, Ottawa. In the meantime, if the case appears meritorious, the man will be given provisional leave of absence for thirty days so that he may return home and continue his civil occupation while his case is being finally disposed of.
