V.A.D.'S ATTEND CHURCH INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

PARADED TO ST. GEORGE'S AND ST. MARY'S CATHEDRALS.

Rev. Cecil Whalley Preached at St. George's and Spoke of the Splendid Work of St. John's Ambulance Association.

A special service was held at St. George's Cathedral on Sunday morning, as it was the occasion of the attendance in a body of the V.A.D.'s. Mrs. G. Hunter Ogilvie was in charge. Dressed in their special uniform they met at St. George's hall where a procession was formed for the parade to the main entrance of the Cathedral.

The front pews on both sides of the centre aisle were reserved for them. Rev. Cecil Whalley preached from the text "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto the least of these my brethren ye have done it unto me."

He gave a brief history of the Order of St. John of Jerusalem and showed that the V.A.D.'s were affiliated with that very ancient order. The members of that order were consecrated to their work—they were a religious order and while during the crusades the military character of the order and its original purpose was never lost sight of. Early in the first Crusade a hospital for women in connection with the order was established at Jerusalem. The speaker gave an interesting account of the Crusades and of the ultimate decay of the order.

In 1878 St. John's Ambulance Association was founded in England for the purpose of giving first aid to persons injured in accidents on roads, railways or in occupations in civil life, and a branch was formed in Canada in 1910. The present grand prior is the Duke of Connaught, and the Duke of Devonshire is the patron of the Ambulance Association in Canada.

Instruction is given in first aid, elementary nursing, hygiene and sanitation; the manufacture and distribution of ambulances, materiel, organization of ambulance corps, invalid transport corps; nursing corps.

The great message the speaker wished to convey was the sense of high calling, pride in the order, its history and aims. It was a purely Christian work and required lack of self-consciousness. The real reward was the commendation of the King who sees the work of the humblest in this war.

Appropriate hymns were sung and the chancel was beautifully decorated with flowers for the occasion.

ALIEN LABOR QUESTION
Discussed by the Civil and Military Vigilance Committee.

The civil and military vigilance committee of Kingston met Sunday night, and there were in attendance seventy-five members of the Trades and Labor Council. The meeting was devoted entirely to the discussion of the alien question. John Nobel, general organizer of the electrical workers, Toronto, gave an address. He dealt with the attitude of the Government toward the native labor, and asserted that the Government favored the employment of aliens by private employers in order that wages might be kept down and the employer could enrich himself.

The Government does not want labor organized, nor does it want the war veterans organized because it is afraid of what might happen by the union of these two after the war.

PLENTY OF COAL.
One hundred Carloads on Siding in Fairhaven at One Time.

A marine captain informed the Whig, on Monday, that on his last trip to Fairhaven he found one hundred carloads of coal on the siding there. This was the most coal he had ever noticed in waiting at one time. This would go to show that there is plenty of coal. The marine men point out that the one great drawback is the scarcity of boats for transportation. Lack of help is also a great drawback. One vessel was held up in port Monday because the captain could not get an engineer.

To Visit in Toronto.
The appearance of a young lady attired in the regulation army uniform of the United States Aviation Service on the deck of the steamer Toronto on Sunday afternoon attracted much attention from the crowds that were on Swift's wharf. Very neat with her tight-fitting khaki outfit and aviator's cap, she was a most unusual sight and her name was eagerly sought. It was learned that she is the famous aviator, Miss Ruth Law, on her way from New York to Toronto, where she will spend several days as the guest of the city.

IN MARINE CIRCLES.

Movements of Vessels In and About Kingston Harbor.

The steamer Toronto commenced the trips from Toronto to Prescott on Sunday, and passed down on up.

The steamer Omaha, which stayed in port during the storm, cleared at 7 a.m. on Sunday for Lake Erie.

The steamer Buena Vista arrived in port from Smith's Falls on its way to Fairhaven.

M. T. Co's Bulletin: The tug Clyde cleared light for the Cornwall canal; the steamer Seguin is transshipping a cargo of oats from Port Colborne into river barges; the tug Laura Grace cleared with the barge Davie for Sohier Point; the tug Magnolia cleared with the barge Kingston for Charlotte; and the barge Bacon for Port Dalhousie; the tug McNaughton cleared with two grain barges for Montreal; the steamer Chamberlain arrived from Lake Erie with coal for Swift's, and had a barge in tow, which is being unloaded at Portsmouth.

Met Death Two Weeks Ago On the Battlefield in France.

Word was only received on Monday morning by P. J. Madden, 59 Earl street, that his son, Pte. Jerome J. Madden, had been killed in action in France on Sunday, June 9th. The deceased was a well-known young Kingstonian and went overseas about three years ago with No. 5 Field Company, Canadian Engineers, from Queen's University. He was later transferred to the Signal Corps and for some time had been doing duty as a signaller with one of the bowitzer batteries in France.
