**UNDERTAKERS ARE ASKED**

TO SUBMIT TENDERS FOR THE BURIAL OF SOLDIERS.

At Present the Government Allows Fifty Dollars for a Burial—Soldiers and Their Relatives Do Not Like This Latest Move.

The Militia Department is receiving criticism over its action in asking the various undertakers to submit tenders for the burial of bodies of soldiers who die in military hospitals here. The news has leaked out, and it is supposed that the Department has issued the same request to undertakers in all military centres throughout Canada. At present undertakers are paid fifty dollars for the burying of soldiers' bodies. Soldiers and their relatives and friends express themselves strongly over this latest action of the Government "in the interests of economy" in national affairs. They think that the man who has served his country at the front and come home to die should not have undertakers submitting tenders for the lowest possible amount they will take for giving him a decent burial in this land of plenty. In some cases relatives of soldier-dead asked undertakers to show them what the Government pays for and very often the relatives order better caskets, paying the additional amount themselves.
