### PILE OF SHELLS EXPLODED

PT. T. B. TALLEN, OF VERONA, TELLS OF EXCITING TIME.

He Has Been Laid Up as a Result of Being Gassed—Has Warm Words of Praise for the Work of British and Canadian Airmen Against Huns.

Mrs. E. A. Tallen, of Verona, has received a letter from her son, Pte. Thomas B. Tallen. He was gassed and suffered trench feet, and about a month ago had his tonsils removed. He was confined in the West Cliff Hospital in England for some months, and was afterwards removed to Bramshott Camp and later on to Bristol, Eng., on leave. He is being entertained at the home of Dr. Genge, a relative of his grandfather.

Pte. Tallen tells about an exciting time he had when an ammunition "dump" went up. He says shells were scattered all over. One shell hit a pile of shells. Fortunately no person was injured.

The writer stated that the British airmen had been doing some great work against the Germans. The writer also had the privilege of hearing an address from a man named Maloney, who was taken prisoner, and he stated that he would have starved to death but for the parcels which were sent to him from England. He said the boys who are prisoners depend a great deal on the parcels they get from the prisoners' relief fund.

"Our airmen are doing great work against the German airmen and in German laws," says the writer. "I hope the German people enjoy these air raids. Perhaps they will not be so enthusiastic about raiding London after some of their own towns have been bombed."
