"The Dominion."  
What could better represent this  
wonderful country than by having  
forty-five children of Canada hold-  
ing aloft a monster Canadian flag?  
This original idea is one which has  
never before been shown to a Can-  
adian public. It is one which should  
prove a credit to the parade, and  
the veterans hope will act as a pa-  
triotic inspiration to everyone in  
realizing the significance of the  
saying that "the children support  
the flag of any country."

"Miss Canada."  
Following out the previous float  
it was indeed a happy idea to have  
this splendid float as the third in  
the line. In this there are to be  
ten young ladies (one for each of  
the provinces, including the Yukon  
territory), and these will carry out  
some distinctive feature of one of  
the provinces.

"Liberty."  
This tribute to our Allies to the  
south—the United States—shows  
what the Canadian returned soldier  
done and what will be done by the  
neighboring republic. It links the  
soldiers of North America who are  
part of the Allied armies into a bond

of comradeship never displayed in  
quite this way.

"In Flanders Fields."  
Taken from that much quoted  
poem of the same name, this float  
shows in a striking way the supreme  
sacrifice made by so many of the  
sons of Canada. It is grimly real-  
istic and represents something  
which has been brought home too  
many times to Canada—the death  
of a soldier in the battlefield. There  
is an inspiration in this float, how-  
ever, which should do much to show  
that the sufferings of those behind  
are appreciated by the returned sol-  
diers as well as the other citizens of  
the Dominion.

"Canada's Greatest Asset."  
Boys are undoubtedly Canada's  
greatest asset, and although those  
of the other sex may dispute this  
honor with them, the float being ar-

ranged to represent the Y.M.C.A.  
boys' department will be an inter-  
esting spectacle.

"All Gone Save Honor."  
This picture of the heroic Bel-  
gian soldier will be borne out in a  
realistic manner on a float in this  
greatest of great parades. It will  
show the tattered flag, but despite  
the sadness of the feature there will  
be in it the spirit that has made  
King Albert's army what it has  
come to be known as—the bravest  
of the brave.

"Ypres" and "Vimy."  
Under these two headings—  
words that will ever be of the great-  
est interest to Canadians who un-  
derstand that which is taking place  
in France to-day in the defence of  
liberty—there will be over 150  
children used. In human letters  
ten feet long these children will  
spell out two of the greatest words  
of Canada's history.

"Tommy's Friend."  
The nursing sister of the Army  
Medical Corps has been eulogized  
by many poets and writers. It took  
the Great War Veterans' Associa-  
tion to pay a greater tribute to her  
by having her as a feature in their  
parade on Dominion. This float  
promises to be one of the best fea-  
tures of a great procession.

"For Humanity's Sake."  
The Richardson Chapter of the  
I.O.D.E. are taking over this fea-  
ture, and will demonstrate to the  
public every thing which has been  
done and which will be done or can  
be done by the people at home for  
those soldiers who are fighting the  
Empire's battles in France.

"First Aid Dressing Hut."  
This is in line with the other tri-  
butes that the Medical Corps is re-  
ceiving from the returned soldiers.  
The hut or dressing station as it is  
commonly called is one of the great-  
est innovations of this war. It has  
saved countless lives and more than  
deserves a prominent place in such  
a parade on Dominion Day.

"High Frequency."  
This float is a reproduction of the  
message and other X-ray portion of  
the scientific medical administra-  
tion now being used to save the  
lives of our "Tommys." It is in-  
dicative of the returned soldier that  
he should give such a compliment to  
that great life saver.

"Comforts for Tommy."  
The returned soldiers thoroughly  
appreciate the Monarch Knitting  
Company in preparing this float,  
which is to show every stage of  
making knitted goods which have  
played such a prominent part in the  
lives of the soldiers of Canada who  
have been living—and dying—on  
the fields of France and Flanders.

"A Helping Hand."  
With characteristic enterprise the  
Military Y.M.C.A. have taken over  
the preparation of a float and are  
giving it the above title. With a  
most complete display of their own  
apparatus and utensils they are  
showing the public in this way that  
which they are attempting to do  
for the soldiers of the Allied armies.

"Tractor."  
To link the army and the farm  
together was a clever idea which is  
being shown by having a farm  
tractor—one of the new Govern-  
ment recognized kind—in this pa-  
rade. It should be an inspiration to  
greater production and the return-  
ed men hope that it will help ad-  
vertise and impress that idea on  
the people.

"Something Accomplished."  
This tribute to vocational train-  
ing which is doing such a tremend-  
ous amount of good in rehabilitating  
the returning soldier for civilian life  
is a big feature of the parade and  
deserves the prominent position  
which it will occupy.

"Victory" and "The Tank."  
These the last two of the long line  
will follow each other and bring to  
a glorious end one of the most re-  
markable collection of public tree  
entertainments ever shown to the  
public. Perhaps it is significant of  
the returned soldiers' thoughts that  
they should link the two features so  
closely together.
