

A Lettuce Tip.

Lettuce should be sown three times during July, and the young seedlings must be kept well watered. In fact, all lettuce should be kept very moist to prevent it from running to seed too quickly. Good, crisp lettuce is some-

thing that all war gardeners are keen to have, and frequently it is a disappointment to them to find it going to seed and coarsening in the process. If you have not planted your lettuce in a shaded place, you might huild a cheesecloth frame over the plants that the beginning to hoad up, and spray them night and morning during the hot weather. This is the real secret of good, crisp lettuce.




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
