THE STEAMER ROCHESTER

IS TO BE USED ON MONTREAL ROUTE. Taken Off Lake Michigan and Will Run Between Montreal and Saugeenay. The steamer Rochester, built by the Richelleu and Ontario Navigation Company to run on the route between Ogdensburg, N.Y., and Youngstown, N.Y., several years ago, will be operated on the Montreal-Saugeenay route during the balance of the season. When the Rochester was placed on the Ogdensburg route it was hoped that a passenger line touching only towns on the south side of the lake and river would prove a paying venture, but this expectation was not realized and after the experiment had been tried out and found unprofitable the service was discontinued. The Rochester is a night boat accommodating 500 passengers. While on the Ogdensburg route she was commanded by Capt. James Owens. The boat was subsequently placed in the passenger service on Lake Michigan but the Eastland disaster in Chicago harbor had such an injurious effect on the excursion business on that route that the boat was later taken to Sarnia and laid up.

Held Up by Fog. Everything was reported to be very quiet in marine circles on Wednesday morning. A dense fog prevailed all night, and many vessels were tied up as a result of the fog. The steamer Buena Vista was in port on her way to Oswego to load coal for Smith's Falls. The steamer Tolly is in port on her way from Port Colborne to Montreal. The steamer Toronto was overdue three hours on Wednesday morning and arrived at 8.30 a.m. on the way from Toronto to Prescott. The steamer Belleville arrived from Toronto at 11.30 p.m. on Tuesday night and left at 12.35 a.m. for Montreal. The boat only proceeded as far as Cedar Island when the fog forced it to return, and it did not clear until Wednesday morning.

TO CONSTRUCT PROVINCIAL ROAD

(Continued from Page 1.) try, was a common opinion, and their betterment, he contended, was essential if only from the standpoint of the desirability of unity. The member for South Leeds, John R. Dargavel, endorsed the work that was being accomplished by the Good Roads Association. He confessed that, although he had some interest in the betterment, he had not taken an active part in the movement. Nevertheless, he was sure that the efforts of the association had been productive of many benefits and felt confident that no other body had done more work to secure better highways. He stated that the department of highways had in consideration the construction of a provincial highway and that it was almost settled that the road would pass through South Leeds. This, he believed, would add materially to the wealth and welfare of the county—the things he most desired.

Mr. McLean's Announcement. A. W. McLean, Deputy Minister of Provincial Highways, was the next speaker, and his remarks were punctuated with frequent rounds of applause as he outlined the plans of the Government. "I recall a previous visit to your town," said Mr. McLean in part, "when I spoke on the good roads movement. I distinctly remember the enthusiasm at that time, and I do believe I have ever observed so much enthusiasm as in this town. I am sure that it still exists, and I can assure you that you will be counted among the good roads in the near future.

"In spite of the many calls that of necessity must come in wartime, there has been improvement in some of these highways, largely through the co-operation of the municipalities. The time for lack of interest in good roads has passed away because of the numerous cars that have been bought, and you will all experience in the future the blessing of good roads. Roads are necessary to progress, materially and socially, and Canada is destined to be a great country, we can make no greater mistake than to neglect our highways. "It is intimated that the provincial authorities have determined on a substantial provision for highways in the future. This provincial highway will extend from Windsor on the west to the border of Quebec on the east, with a branch to Ottawa and perhaps to Hamilton and Niagara Falls. This would join up the present county systems of highways. "It has been suggested that this road should run through Gananoque. I can assure you that I know of no reason why it should not and some excellent reasons why it should. I can, therefore, assure you that the road will pass through your town. (Applause.) "The war has cut down our expenditure on public works, but we need some improvements which can be made without impairing our efficiency or side-tracking our policy of economy in time of war. Such an artery of transportation is very necessary. The plan is to have the province take over the highway with co-operation from the counties to repair and then to construct from point to point where transportation is heaviest and complete finally a national highway such as you are familiar with in the state of New York."

Mr. McLean explained that this road construction would hardly be expected in time of war, and intimated that for the present the roads would be kept in repair. When the soldiers return from the front he considered that it would be splendid for the country to have some such work for them to do when they were forced once more into civilian occupation. A. M. Rankin, M.P.P., who has been very active in securing good roads, made a few remarks in which he expressed his pleasure that the

Government had seen fit to take over the roads, and with the assistance of the county councils maintain them until a provincial highway could be constructed. He stated that it would take some time to organize the work but that the province would be proud of its roads in the future. Considerable interest centred around Hon. George S. Henry, the newly appointed Minister of Agriculture. He is a forestal speaker and has an appearance commanding respect and admiration. He commented, briefly, upon the difficulties in the way of road improvement in war time, but stated that he was looking for their development with the consequent betterment of the people of the province. During the evening the Citizens' band gave a number of pleasing selections and the meeting closed with the singing of the national anthem.

MILITARY TO TRAIN DENTALS AND MEDICALS

A Specially Chosen List Will be Prepared in the Near Future. Owing to the scarcity of material available for the Army Medical and Army Dental Corps, arrangements have been made at Ottawa, and announced locally, to fill up the ranks of these two units and to keep a constant supply of men in training to meet any future demands. Lists of young men, matriculants, or those who have completed their first years of the medical or dental colleges, will be selected by the military authorities, and will be put through their regular medical or dental courses at approved colleges or institutions; and when they have been trained in this manner they will be used by the army. This is a radical departure from ordinary military work and will be carried out in co-operation with the various colleges, but it means simply that the army will pick out enough promising young men to entitle the ranks of the Army Medical and Army Dental Corps being kept up to strength, and will supervise their education along these lines. And at the end, if the men make good, there will be commissions awaiting them.

A Popular Verdict. Recently at Napanee, Judge Lavell gave a popular decision in a case tried before him. The action was in brief that a milk drawer named Walsh, was passing along a highway town of Fredericksburg and the horse he was driving died later from the effects of over-exertion in endeavoring to haul a load of milk over the boundary road. Judge Lavell awarded the owner of the horse full damages of \$175 and costs in the action were assessed against the townships. Judge Lavell in giving judgment commented upon the penny-wise-and-pound-foolish policy of municipalities in not keeping their roads in proper repair, and further intimated that it might be a proper case for preferring an indictment against both corporations for their persistent neglect to perform their duty with respect to roads. The judgment should have a salutary effect in these counties. A lot of money is spent on good roads and that ends the duty of the counties or townships. No provision is made for the upkeep. It is high time that some reasonable system was adopted for the upkeep of roads or else the money is largely wasted.
