## THE TROOPS AT THE FORT

THE 3RD BATTALION, C.G.R., IS STATIONED THERE.

There are 700 Men on the Strength—The Fort Has Been Greatly Improved.

A fatigue party of the 3rd Battalion C.G.R. is employed on the roadway over the hill to Fort Henry. A good job is being done. The road was badly cut up by the action of the water following heavy rains. A Whig representative visited the fort on Thursday and found a marked improvement in the manner in which guard duty is performed by this unit. The environs and the approach to the fort create a very favorable impression. There are no unsightly weeds or long grass to be seen and whitewash has been liberally applied. The incinerator and ash dump have not been neglected. Sgt. G. Atwood was in charge at the gate. He is an old 14th P. W.O. R. boy who went overseas in the 20th Battalion and fought on Vimy, Hill 70, Lens and Passchendaele. He was wounded and burned by mustard gas in the last action in Canada. He reached home on April 25th last, and was promoted to the rank of sergeant. He wears the long service ribbon. Three of his brothers are still in France and a fourth is in charge of a troop train in Western Canada.

Sgt.-Major Simms, a South African veteran, and late instructor of the I.S. of I. is sergeant-major of the battalion. He has taken a keen interest in greater production, and the fort gardens are among the best to be found anywhere. He has tomatoes of good size already. The interior of the fort is most scrupulously clean and neat. The administration offices have been very much improved. Three of the casements on the west side are used for orderly rooms and the O.C.'s office, and they are connected by doorways made in the partitions.

The reorganization of No. 3 special service company into the 3rd Battalion Canadian Garrison Regiment, was effected after Lieut.-Col. Crawford was appointed, and the change gave the unit a more permanent character. Major Sauve, late of the 21st Battalion, is second in command, and Capt. E. Freeman, late of the 2nd Battalion, is adjutant. Lieut. Palmer is quartermaster. Capt. Weeks is O.C. of "A" Company, and Lieut. Mills is O.C. of "B" Company. Lieut. Bennett, late of the 2nd Battalion, completes the staff. There are 700 men on the strength, but there is a constant fluctuation owing to discharges and transfers, and the unit might be properly termed a demobilizing unit. In the meantime it furnishes guard, escorts and fatigue parties. The guards at Lindsay and Trenton belong to this unit.

All of the members of the staff are returned men. In addition to the garrison the fort is occupied by defaulter, who are provided with suitable quarters. The area containing ordnance stores is enclosed by a high wire fence, and the rooms of the master gunner, who fires the gun which the citizens of Kingston set their clocks, are occupied by the guard on duty.

### Presentation At Sheatown.

On Monday evening, July 8th, a pleasant event took place at the home of Mr. and Mrs. William Kavanaugh, when the citizens of Sheatown showed their loyalty to one of their young men, Pte. Hilliard Kavanaugh, by presenting him with an expensive military wrist watch. The young ladies making the presentation were the Misses Augusta Leeder, Aggie Cox, Eulalia Flood and Mary Cox. Pte. Kavanaugh is one of Canada's many brave young men who has seen fit to leave home to do his bit for the cause of righteousness by enlisting in the infantry service at Barrie. Being an only son, his parents have made a great sacrifice in giving him for his country's service, but sacrifice willingly made is freely repaid. Many good and earnest wishes follow Pte. Kavanaugh, whose honorable manhood will win him many new friends. It is hoped he will have no end of good luck and that a speedy peace may shortly bring him home to his anxious parents and neighbors. Mr. and Mrs. Kavanaugh feel deeply grateful to their friends for the mark of respect shown their son.

## KINGSTON HAS OLDEST ORANGEMAN IN CANADA

Ex-Aid Joseph Tait Has Been Member of the Order Seventy-three Years.



To-day is the Glorious Twelfth of July, and if it brings greater joy to one member than another, it must come to ex-Aid Joseph Tait, of this city, who holds the record of being the oldest Orangeman in Canada. Mr. Tait has been an Orangeman for seventy-three years, and this is certainly some record. He is widely known and highly respected. He joined the Orange Order in Ireland in 1845, and has lived in Kingston for seventy years. He is in his 92nd year.

Bulletin—The tug Laura Grace arrived from Montreal with two light barges and cleared with the barge Brighton for Fairhaven; the tug Magnolia, arrived with the barge Bacon from Port Colborne with grain and the barge Kingston with coal from Charlotte; the tug Magnolia cleared with the barge Godfrey and Eagan for Port Colborne; the steamer Joyland passed up at midnight, loaded with package freight from Montreal for Port William.

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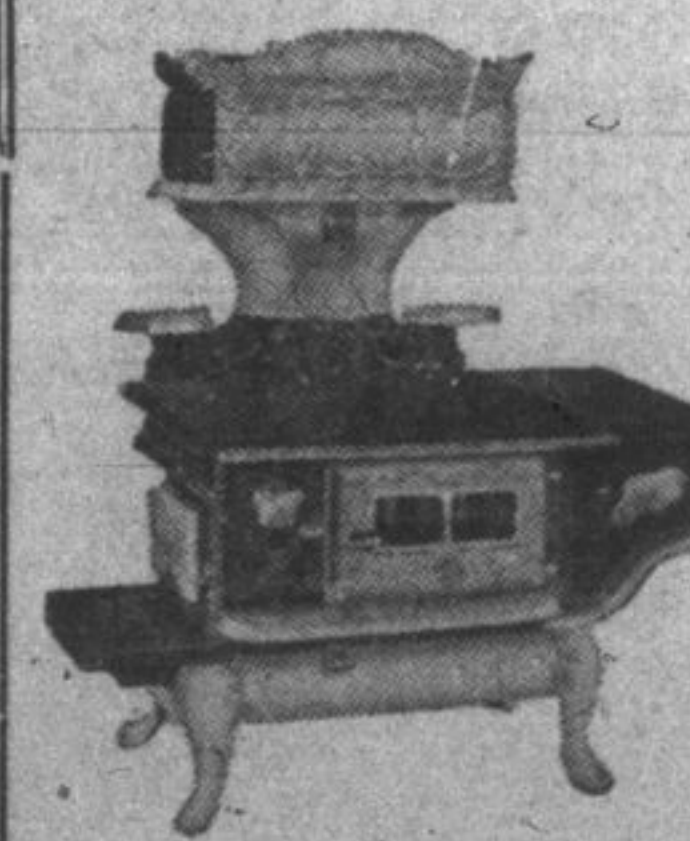
