STRUCK OFF ASSESSMENTS.

Havelock Council's Action as Result of Appeal—Citizen Protest.
Keene, July 12.—By a vote of three to two, Havelock Council, it is stated, sitting as a Court of Revision, struck off all income assessments as the result of considering the appeal of one ratepayer that his assessment was too high, and a citizen has appealed to the judge, protesting that the striking off was contrary to law. The appeal affects the income assessment of fifty-five persons, it is said.

SOME \$100,000,000 WORTH

OF GERMAN BONDS WERE SOLD IN UNITED STATES.

Revenue Was Used for Propaganda Work, Including Purchase of Part of American Press.

New York, July 12.—The Bush family of St. Louis bought at least \$1,000,000 worth of German war bonds which the Government believes were sold in this country for propaganda and for the purchase of other newspapers, according to a statement just issued by Alfred L. Becker, Deputy State Attorney-General. Mr. Becker added that probably more than \$100,000,000 worth of the bonds had been sold in the United States.

Mr. Becker emphasized the point that while the United States was still neutral, the Imperial German Government, without a cent of expense to itself, established a fund to seduce part of the American press with good American gold, exchanged for mere scraps of paper.

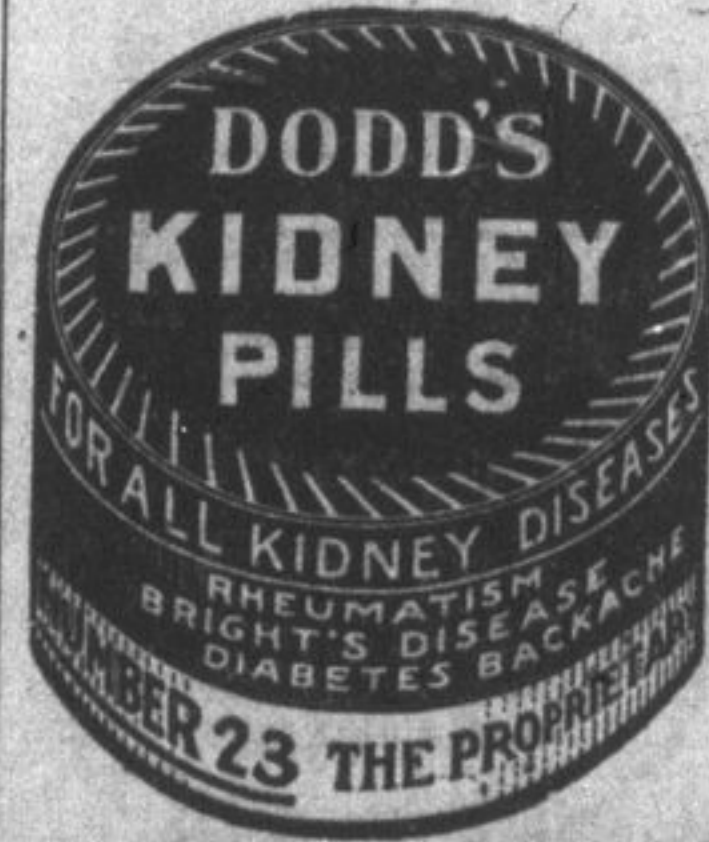
