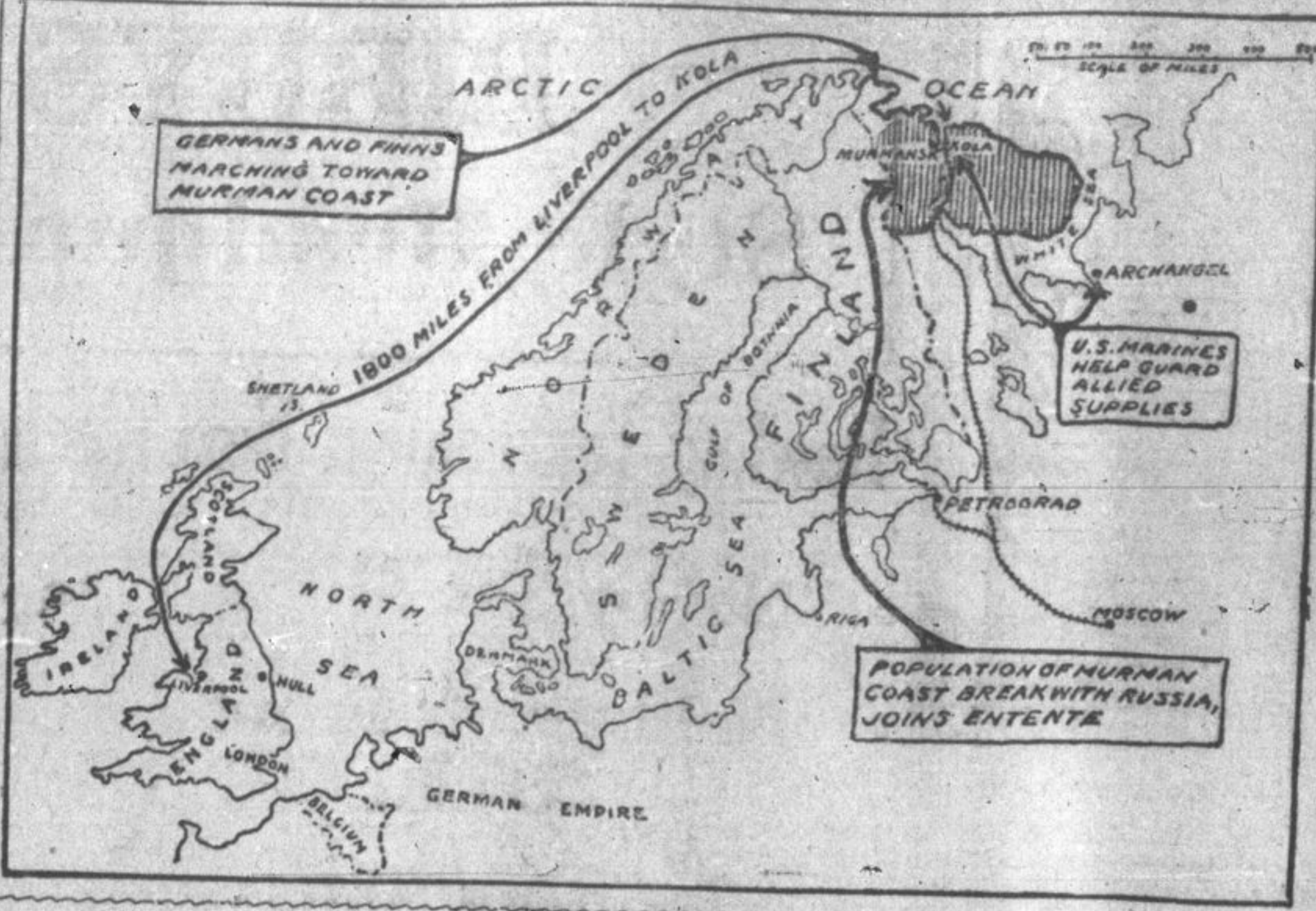

GET MEDALS FOR BRAVERY

IN RESCUING LIET.-COL. L. W. MULLOY FROM DROWNING.

Capt. Charles Williams, of Cardinal, and Lieut. Caldwell, of Iroquois, Awarded Royal Humane Society Medal—Both Are Overseas.

A despatch from Iroquois to the Royal Humane Society, medals have just reached Reeve Davy, of Iroquois, for Capt. Charles Williams, of Cardinal, and Lieut. Robert Caldwell, of Iroquois, in recognition of their bravery in saving the life of Lieut. Col. L. W. Mulloy, formerly professor in the Royal Military College, Kingston, at Point Iroquois, in August of last year.

War Tidings. Five American airplanes, which went on a bombing expedition have failed to return. President Wilson signed a bill providing penalties of \$300 fine and six months imprisonment for unauthorized wearing of the uniform of a friendly nation.

GET READY TO QUIT

Teuton Nobles Sell Estates Because They Fear Revolution.

Italian Army Headquarters, July 15.—Austrian prisoners confirm the reports that a large number of noblemen are selling off their estates in Bohemia and Moravia because they fear a revolution. It is said that Count Czernin, former Austro-Hungarian Foreign Minister, has sold for \$3,000,000 crowns all his lands in Bohemia, and that the purchaser was a bank with agricultural interests.

A German submarine, appearing 300 miles off Cape Race on July 6th, captured the Norwegian bark Man King and ordered the crew of nineteen to take to the boats. The crew was saved.

A regiment in the Turkish vilayet of Aidin, southeast of Smyrna, ordered to Mesopotamia, mutinied and murdered its German officers. Many soldiers from regiments sent to suppress the mutiny joined the rebellious troops.

An American naval launch, after aiding a French destroyer in towing a disabled American airplane to safety, was sunk by German shore batteries, losing two of her crew, probably drowned, and two taken prisoner by the enemy.

Lieut.-Gen. Horvath, vice-president and general manager of the Chinese Eastern Railway, having declared himself Premier of a temporary Siberian government, has been proclaimed Provisional Ruler of Siberia. It is officially denied in Vienna that Austrian emissaries have been making overtures for peace to Entente agents in Spain and Switzerland.

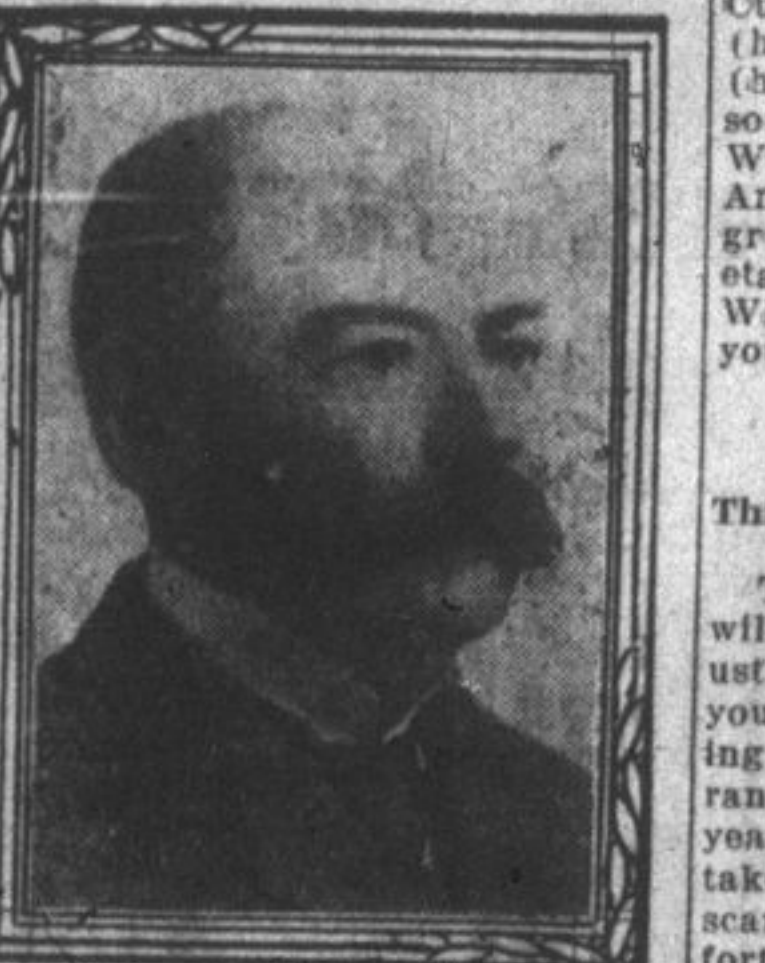
Two thousand Bolshevik troops sent to the White Sea coast were surrounded and disarmed by Revolutionaries.

M. Tchernoff, a leader of the Russian Social Revolutionists, is marching on Moscow at the head of numerous bands of unarmed peasants.

The Allied force is occupying Murman at the request of the local population. The feeling in London about the general Russian situation is much more hopeful than it was a few weeks ago.

German people are getting open in the expression of their dislike of a continuation of the war. The outlook for the crops appears to be generally bad. In certain parts of Bavaria there have been measles weeks for some time, although these were only just announced in the Reichstag, when the people were also

20,000 IN AMERICA HOLD GERMAN BONDS. Certificates Were Put Out in Denominations As Low as \$50.

Washington, July 15.—A fairly complete list of the holders of German Government bonds in the United States is among the assets of secret service men fighting German propaganda. It was said today by officials, discussing the disclosure of the Busch family made last week by Alfred R. Becker, New York, assistant attorney-general.

Names of nearly 20,000 individuals are on the list, which has been built up during the course of secret investigations made during the last two years. A wide distribution was given to the securities and they were issued in denominations of as small as \$50.
