WILL CONFISCATE BOOZE INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

LEFT IN EXPRESS COMPANY'S OFFICES AND NOT CALLED FOR.

License Inspector McCammon Will Take Charge of Liquor Sent For Thirsty Ones Who Did Not Get It in Time—More "Corner Cutters" Fined.

The good old days when "booze" could be shipped into the city were recalled in police court Thursday morning, when a half dozen or so persons were charged with unlawfully having liquor in their name at local express offices. License Inspector William McCammon and C. W. Webster, acting for the Ontario License Board, were present and had the list of names showing the amount of liquor in local express company's offices on July 1st.

In one case it was shown that the liquor had been ordered in March last and was not called for. The man who ordered it was quit willing that it should be shipped back to the liquor firm, but what he is worrying about is whether or not he will get his money back. He will endeavor to get back the good coin he paid for the stuff he ordered for the dry days but did not call for.

The license inspector was given an order to take charge of all the booze in the express offices which was ordered within the proper time but was not called for.

With regard to the crusade against people who violate the rules of the road, the police continue to "carry on." R. Saunders, John Swift and Louis Woodman, who hail from the country, were "soaked" \$5 and costs each for doing the "corner cutting" stunt. Police Constable Arnel was the constable back of the cases.

CONFISCATED BOOZE GOES TO HOSPITALS

License Inspector Receives Permission to Make Distribution.

Some of these fine days, License Inspector William McCammon is going to take a little vacation at the Hotel Dieu, the General Hospital, and the Home for the Aged. He will go on a message of good cheer, for he will have with him in all a dozen or more cases of liquor for distribution for use at these institutions for medical purposes, he having been given permission by the Ontario License Board, to dispose of the liquor confiscated in express offices in this way. And this will be far better than flushing the city sewers with it, as has been the custom on many occasions.

TWENTY GALLONS LIQUOR IN THE POLICE CELLS

But Is Was Confiscated And Is There For Safe-keeping.

If some of the old-time tipplers, who used to give the police considerable trouble before the country went dry, happened to drop into one of the cells at police headquarters, they would be given the surprise of their life, for in one cell, at the present time, there is liquor, perhaps twenty gallons or more, which has been confiscated by the police under the Ontario Temperance Act. The liquor is in suit cases, grips, parcels, baskets, and, in fact, in almost every manner possible. No order has been received as yet for the disposal of the liquor and it has been placed in the cell under lock and key for safe keeping.

Died Quite Suddenly.

Miss Margaret Watts, residing at 415 Johnson street, expired suddenly on Wednesday. She was found in a room by members of the household in an unconscious state and medical aid was summoned immediately, but the doctor pronounced life extinct. Death was due to heart failure. Arranging Memorial Service.

A special service of a national character is being arranged by Rev. Dr. R. J. Wilson, of Chalmers church, for Sunday evening. It will be in memory of those who met death on the Canadian hospital ship Llandovery Castle. All military and civil nurses in the city are arranging to attend. Announcement of the service is to be made in military orders on Saturday and seats are to be reserved for returned soldiers. The sinking of the Llandovery Castle caused the deaths of at least three persons who attended Chalmers in years past—Capt. the Rev. D. G. MacChall, Nursing Sister Mabel MacDiarmid and Nursing Sister Minnie Gallaher. The latter also attended Dr. Wilson's church when she was in Vancouver, B.C.
