

TROPHY GAMES CONCLUDED

DOMINION AND ST. LAWRENCE MATCHES PLAYED WEDNESDAY.

Skip L. A. Nevins, of Ottawa, won the Former and Skip Rev. A. S. Kerr, of Belleville, the Latter-Doubles and Singles Are Proceeding.

Interest centered on the championship games for the Dominion and the St. Lawrence trophies on Wednesday at the St. Lawrence Lawn Bowling Tournament.

The Dominion match was commenced early in the morning, but the rain prevented its completion until the afternoon, when Skip L. A. Nevins, of Victoria Club, Ottawa, defeated A. Purcott, of Queen's Club, Kingston, by 19 to 15. It was a vigorous contest and there was keen rivalry for the trophy.
