Britain Has Already 341,025 Men on Lists-Pensions in Sight Up To 1970.

London, July 18 .- Great Britain will have to pay \$250,000,000 a year if the war ends by next according to an estimate made by A. Bonar Law, Chancellor of the Exchequer. Sir Alfred W. Watn, a Government actuary, estimates that, by 1930, the annual pension harges will have fallen to \$200,-00,000 and that each succeeding deade will show a reduction of \$50,-100,000, but that these pensions will have entirely disappeared by
