A meeting of "Over the Top" committee was held to consider ways and means of visiting some American cities during the summer and fall.

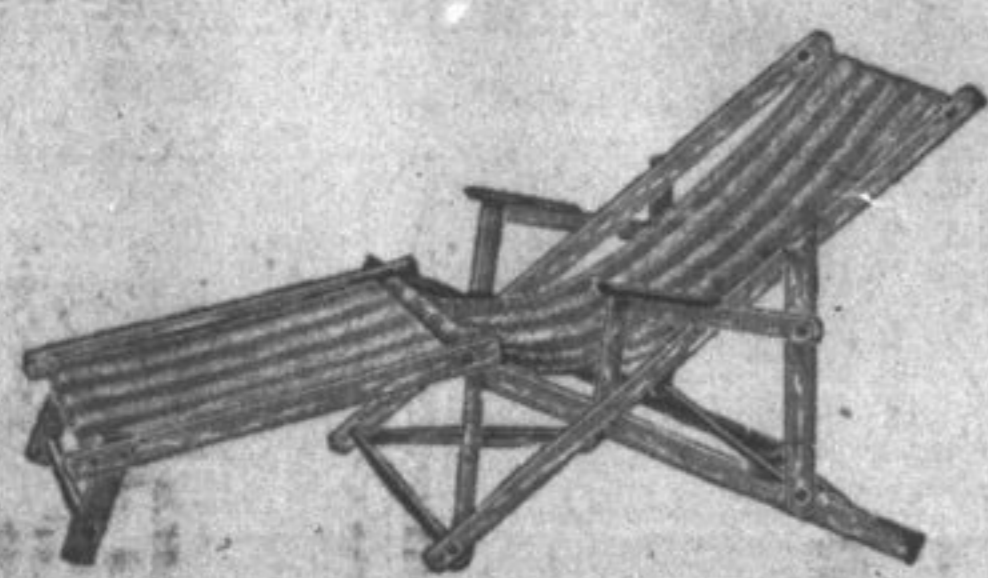

APPOINTED ACCOUNTANT

W. A. PATTERSON GETS POSITION WITH CIVIL UTILITIES.

Was Appointed at Meeting Held on Monday Afternoon—Satisfactory Conference Held With Hydro Commission for Supply of Power.

At a meeting of the Civic Utilities Commission held on Monday afternoon, W. A. Patterson, for some years accountant with N. C. Polson & Company, was appointed accountant for the Civic Utilities Commission to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of James Rigney.

Mr. Patterson had a wide experience in this special line of work previous to taking over his position with the N. C. Polson Company. He was engaged in this work both in Toronto and Montreal, and is regarded as a man especially fitted for the position.

Mr. Burnett, of Toronto, who has been acting as an expert for the commission in the erection of the water works department at a cost of \$131,500, and the tender of Simmons Bros. for three tons of lead, being the lowest, was accepted.

On motion of Commissioner Elliott, the manager was authorized to communicate with Canson Bros., asking them for plans, showing where they propose building the houses and what guarantee they are prepared to give the Commission for the extensions asked for.

The chairman, G. Y. Chown, presided at the meeting, and the other members present were Mayor Hughes and Commissioners R. F. Elliott, T. J. Rigney and R. N. F. Macfarlane.

WENT HUNGRY FOR DAYS

ALTHOUGH HE HAD THE SUM OF \$1,360.27 IN HIS POSSESSION.

David Kenney, of Toronto, Was Removed From Railway Train Suffering From Heat and Hunger, and Taken to General Hospital—Police Made Search and Found the Money.

Sick and emaciated from the effects of the oppressive heat and hunger David Kenney, 101, Mainland street, Toronto, was removed from the early morning G.T.R. train and taken to the General Hospital in S. S. Corbett's ambulance.

It was said that the old man was bound for his home in Toronto from Montreal. Mayor Mederic Martin had issued a warrant for his transportation as far as Kingston apparently under the impression that he was feeble and penniless.

At the hospital Dr. Bogard made a thorough examination of him and found that his weak condition was due to the fact that he had not eaten any food for several days. He was clad in poor garments and to all appearances might have been taken for a man without friends or money in the world.
