LAVED IN KINGSTON.

Charles Cetewayo Claimed to be Son

of Zulu Chieftain. Charles Cetewayo, who, as announced in the Whig on Wednesday, died at Brockville on Tuesday, lived in Kingston for some time, being engaged as a mining expert, and was well-known to many Kingston peo-ple. He boarded on Ontario street. He claimed to be a prince of royal Zulu blood, the son of the late King Cetewayo, of Zululand, and the protege of Queen Victoria. He was engaged in investigating mining properties near Westport. He was about sixty years old. Deceased served in the South African war, was wounded and received a pension for his ser-

MRS, IRA REYNOLDS EXPIRED ON THURSDAY MORNING.

Fell Into the Arms of Mrs. Charles Forte in Flat on the Corner of Wellington and Princess

The excessive heat claimed its first victim on Thursday morning when Mrs. Ira Reynolds expired in the third floor of the building at the cor-ner of Wellington and Princess streets, where the C.P.R. ticket office is situated, and above Dr. S. Ackroyd's office.

Several days ago she came to live with the two other residents of the flat, Mrs. Charles Forte and Miss Marie Prive, who stated that she had subject to recurring attacks from her heart. They stated that about eleven o'clock she had begun to dress, when the oppressiveness of the atmosphere proved too much and she called for

Just as Mrs. Forte reached her sh cried out, "Oh, I'm dying! I'm gone!" She fell into Mrs. Forte's arms unconscious, and had to be removed to a sofa. Corbett's ambulance was summoned and the remains were taken to the morgue for prepar-ation for burial. Dr. Mundell, cor-oner, viewed the body and pronounc-ed death due to heart failure.

The late Mrs. Reynolds was about thirty-seven years of age and was a native of Odessa. She had been residing in Kingston for the past three years and both Mrs. Forte and Miss Prive remarked that she was a very kind and genial woman with whom to live. She is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Henry Hopkins, Oshawa, and Miss Jennie, Kingston, and one son, Giddle, Kingston.

Mrs. Street, who suffered quite serious injury in a recent automobile accident is progressing favorably. The wound to the arm and the one on the head necessitated a number of stitches. One of the boys was rendered unconscious but has made a good recovery.
