In local marine circles the air is heavy with the maledictions of wrathy masters of coal vessels who are still hot over the treatment accorded them at Oswego. Capt. J. S. McQueen, of the steamer City of Dresden, was seen again by the Whig and stated that it was common opinion that some of the officials were beginning to come down. They say that it is impossible to deny the favoritism and discrimination in the face of the widespread discontent which characterizes all the masters of the small vessels who are attempting to load at Oswego.
