WAYWARD GIRLS IN COURT

POLICE STARTED CRUSADE ON "STREET WALKERS."

One Girl Was Sent to Mercer Reformatory for an Indefinite Period and the Other, Not Yet Sixteen Years Old, Was Given a Chance—Cases in Police Court.

The police have started a crusade against girl "street walkers."

Two were rounded on Thursday night. One was sent to the Mercer Reformatory and the other, who is not yet sixteen years of age, was given a chance.

Mrs. Smith, police matron, gave evidence against the girls. Both have been walking the streets at all hours of the day and night, frequenting restaurants and accosting men on the street.

Acting Sergeant Samuel Arniel told about the girls having been warned to keep off the street. The one girl was sent to the Mercer Reformatory for an indefinite period. Good conduct will secure her release.

The mother of the younger girl was present when the case came up. The girl pleaded guilty to the charge of vagrancy against her, and as she did so her mother burst into tears. The other girl denied the charge of vagrancy, but was found guilty on the evidence. The girl given the chance must report to Mrs. Smith at stated intervals.

A citizen who got under the influence of liquor he had in his own house was fined \$10 and costs.

DE GOUTTE'S RECORD.

Made His Reputation in the Colonial Service.

General de Goutte, the victor of Chateau-Thierry, who shares with Generals Mangin, de Mitry, Berthelot, and Gouraud in directing operations in the battle of the Marne, is one of the most brilliant of the young French generals, says an announcement given out by the Official Bureau of French Information.

This reads:

"By a curious coincidence, General de Goutte is a colonial like Mangin and Gouraud. All his military career has been made in the colonial campaigns of the French republic in Tunis from 1890 to 1895, in Madagascar from 1895 to 1896, in China in 1900 and in Morocco from 1911 to 1913.

"Like Mangin and like Petain, he was at the outbreak of the war a simple colonial and has revealed himself during the war, especially in the battle of Ailette in November, 1917, where with his army corps he captured 4,000 prisoners, 134 guns, and 282 machine guns in a few hours. He is now commanding a whole army, including American troops, which attacked the Germans from the Oureq to the Marne and took Chateau Thierry."

LOADING COAL VESSELS.

It is Expected That Capt. Mann Will Speak.

In local marine circles the air is heavy with the maledictions of wrathful masters of coal vessels who are still hot over the treatment accorded them at Oswego. Capt. J. S. McQueen, of the steamer City of Dresden, was seen again by the Whig and stated that it was common opinion that some of the officials were beginning to come down.

The marine men still endorse the charges laid before United States Consul Felix S. S. Johnson by the coal dealers. They say that it is impossible to deny the favoritism and discrimination in the face of the widespread discontent which characterizes all the masters of the small vessels who are attempting to load at Oswego. It is expected that Capt. Mann will issue a statement giving his version of the unfortunate occurrence shortly.
