MADE PEACE OVERTURES.

German Professor Had Rigmorale of Cant and Deceit.

A story of how an attempted German peace offensive directed toward President Wilson was turned down indignantly by Prof. Quidde, an American living in Geneva, is told by the Swiss correspondent of the London Daily Mail.

The German Government, according to the correspondent, tried to get peace offers sent to the President through Prof. Heron, who was visited on April 19 by Prof. Quidde, of Munich, a friend of Count von Hertling, the Imperial German Chancellor. Prof. Quidde was accompanied by the Dutch pacifist, Dr. Jong van Beek.

Prof. Quidde said he had come to prepare the way for a meritorious peace, and gave Prof. Heron to understand that he spoke for Chancellor von Hertling and the German Foreign Office. He assured the American professor that the peace party in the Reichstag was about to gain predominance in Germany.

Prof. Quidde said, was willing to make the following terms: First, to grant autonomy to Alsace-Lorraine within the limits of the German empire, provided the allies would not broach the subject of Alsace-Lorraine at the peace conference.

Second, the Brest-Litovsk peace treaties not to be discussed at the peace conference, although the allies might submit claims for the revision of them and Germany might make certain concessions.

Third, no economic war against Germany after the war.

Fourth, German colonies to be restored.

Prof. Quidde asserted that the present offensive in France had the ultimate objective of achieving a durable peace.

Prof. Heron, the Daily Mail's correspondent writes, after listening to the German professor, exclaimed: "I wonder that you have the effrontery to ask me to lay such a rigmorale of cant and deceit before the American people. The United States intends to continue the fighting until the Prussian military power and, if necessary, the Prussian State along with it, is extinguished forever as a power for evil, whether it takes one year or ten."

Prof. Quidde adds the correspondent, left the house weeping.

The Prof. Quidde referred to above is probably Prof. Ludwig Quidde, a historian of the University of Munich, the Bavarian capital. He was elected to the 20th Universal Peace Conference at the Hague.

Reaction from Infirmities.

Napoleon's inordinate ambition and enormous egoism were probably exaggerated by the fact that he was physically small and insignificant. Tamerlane, who made himself master of nearly the whole of Asia, was lame, and according to one of his biographers, "deformed and impious of feature." Pope, with his deformed body, became "The Wicked Wasp of Twickenham." Byron, doubtless spurred by his clubfoot, swam the Hellespont. The Kaiser, with his arm withered from birth, Treitschke, stone-deaf from childhood, and Nietzsche, with years of brain disorder leading to paresis, were the unholy trinity of the new Teuton religion which has driven a whole nation into irresponsible fanaticism and almost wrecked the planet. King Richard III. exclaimed: "Then, since the heavens have shap'd my body so, Let hell make crooked my mind to answer it."

TURNING ALL HER FRIENDS

THE SINN FEIN CRIMINAL LUNACY IS DISASTROUS.

Older Priests in Ireland Waking Up to Seriousness of Conditions Created by Rebels.

Dublin, July 30.—Some of the older Irish priests, particularly in County Westford, have been speaking out strongly against the Sinn Feiners. Very Rev. Canon Walsh, presiding at a meeting of the Crossabeg and Ballymurn branch of the United Irish League, said the prospect before Ireland was a gloomy one, as the "criminal lunacy of Sinn Fein" was turning all Ireland's friends against her.

By insulting and trampling on the American flag and cheering for Emperor William, he said: "The ungrateful Sinn Fein faction" was turning the French republic, the American nation, and the English democracy into bitter enemies of Ireland.

Rather than gain independence for Ireland, they were more likely to gain twenty years of coercion and martial law, if any general support were accorded by Irishmen to the antics of the "miserable faction," whose record, said Canon Walsh, so far was one of dissension, disruption and disaster.

The democracy of England, he continued, was favorably disposed towards Irishmen, and was willing to do them justice, but they would never consent to the sheer lunacy of total separation, and until the evil spirit of Sinn Fein was banished from the land Ireland would labor under the yoke of oppression.

Resolutions were passed at the meeting condemning the German outrage in murdering seven innocent fishermen off the Galway coast and denouncing the Gaelic League as "a feeder of Sinn Fein."
