PROF. MASARYK IS A CHAMPION OF LIBERTY.

Driven From Prague Because of His Influence Among Bohemians, the Famous Slav Thinker Has Done Great Work for the Allies and for Liberty of His Oppressed Fellow-Countrymen.

On his way from the Far West to Washington a hale and vigorous old professor stopped off at Chicago the other day and found himself the shy and unexpected object of a great popular demonstration.

So the professor left his seat in Parliament, went back to his university, and began to teach the virtues of self-reliance and a more practical kind of patriotism. At this time, he was a strong and firm believer in Russia as the high champion of Slav hopes.

These were the wild days of the Bosnian troubles, and the Serbs were existing in a state of terror. Shortly followed many opportunities for Masaryk to show that he was not only a real political leader, but also a true fighting Czech.

Disbrow Among Thieves. Newspapers received here from Breslau, Germany, tell of a woman, whose criminal career in Vienna University a firm place in European thought. He was then just short of thirty. How long ago, too, it is since, after years of pleading by the Bohemians for a university of their own, Tasia granted the request, and the Czech University was founded at Prague.

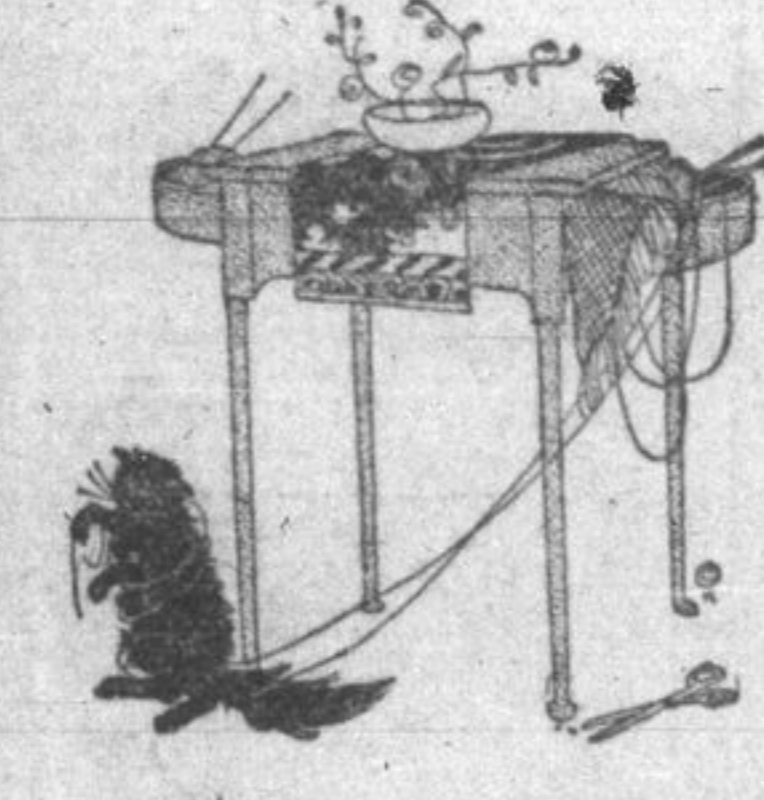

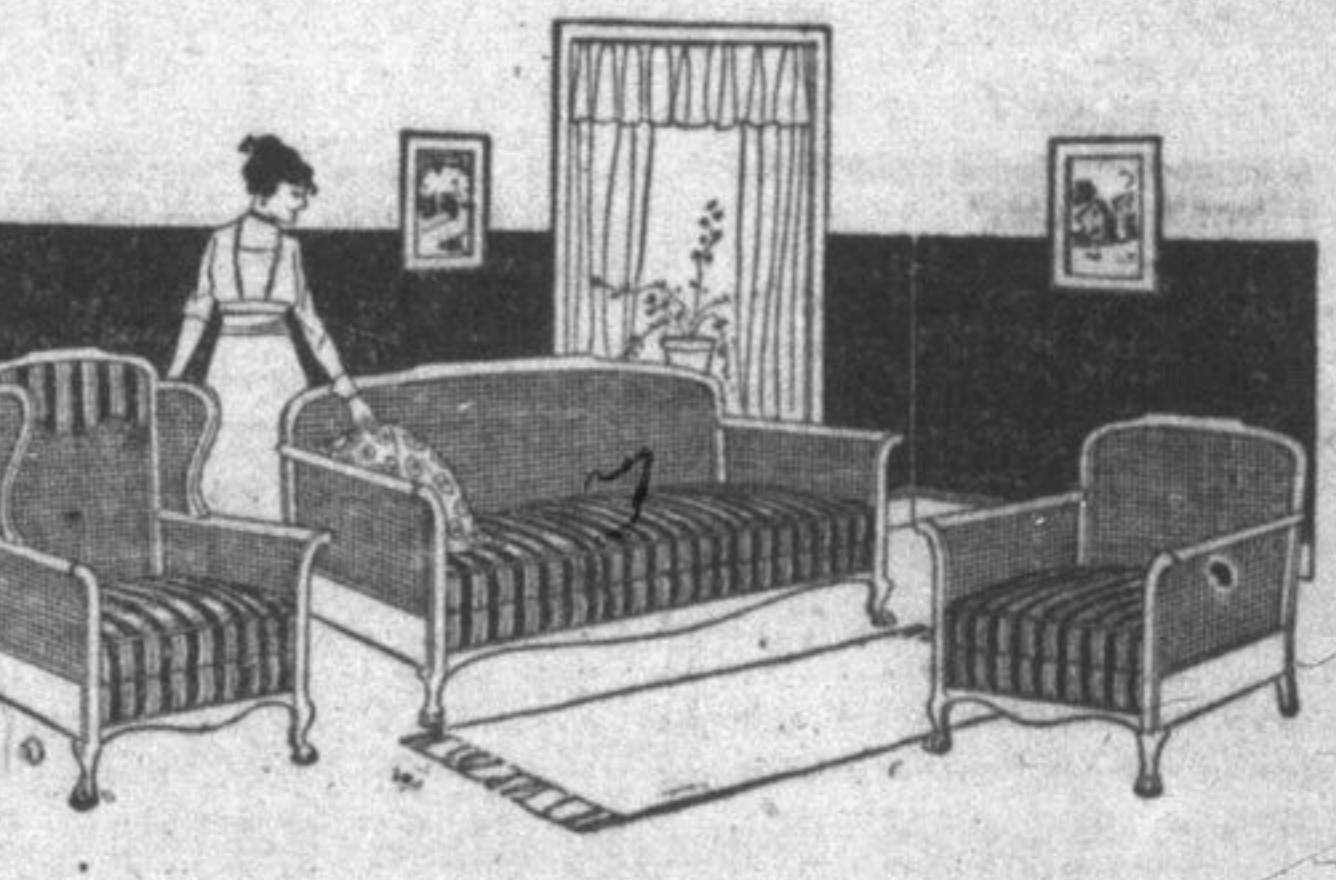
