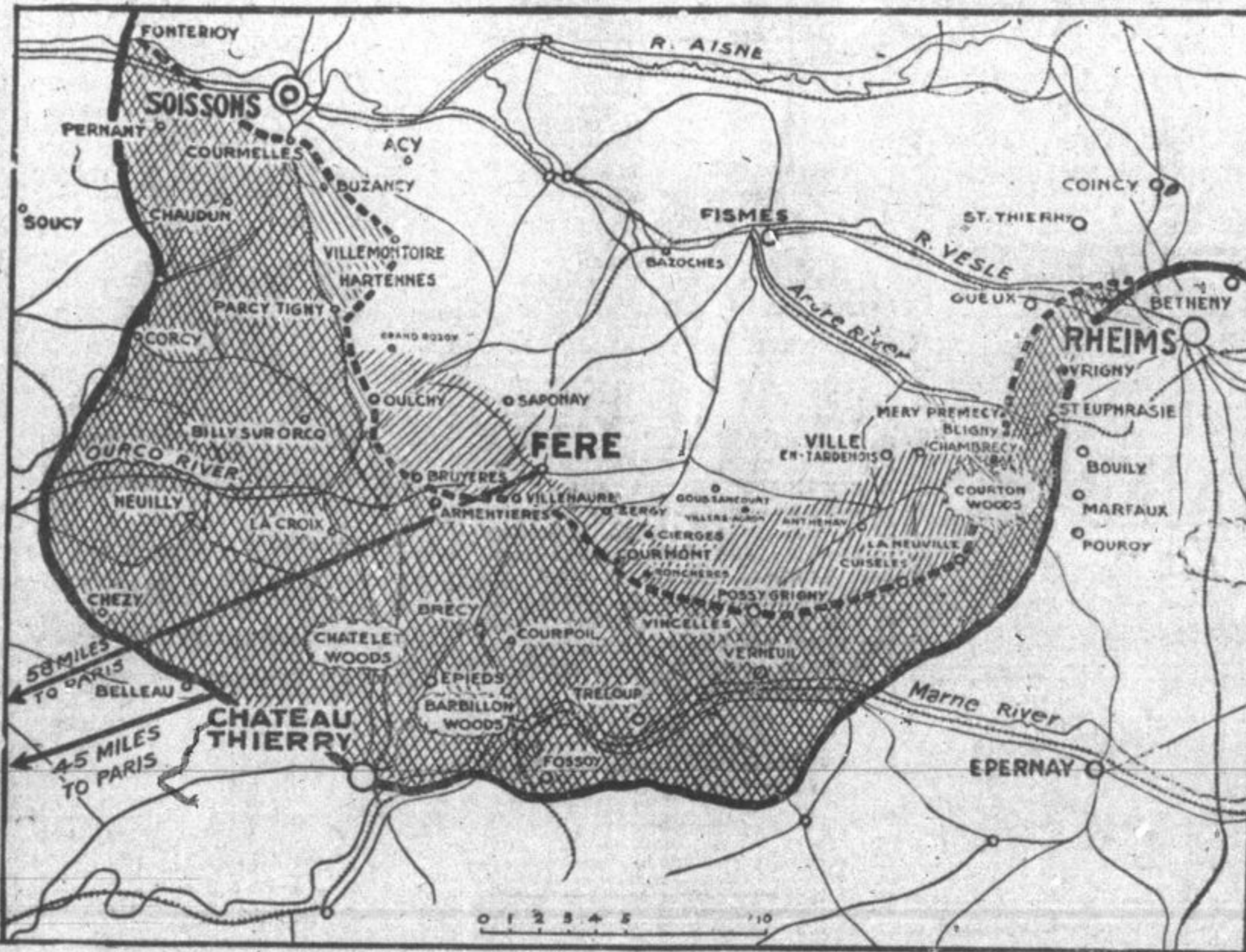

#### Enjoying Country Life.

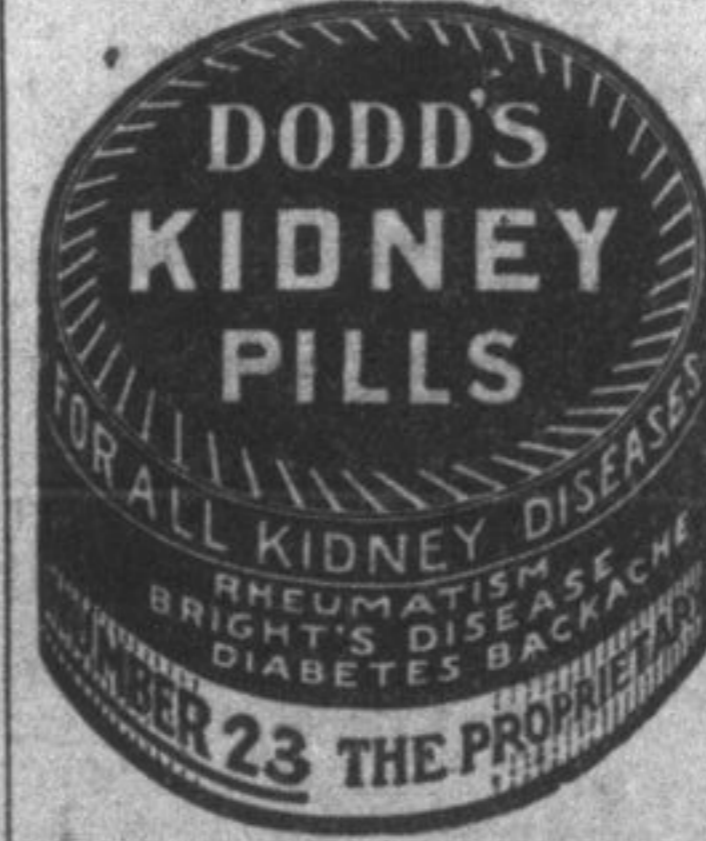
