**ALLIED OLYMPIC GAMES**

May Soon be Held on the Western Front.

It is possible that an Allied series of Olympic games will be held soon within the range of the big guns on the western front. So successful have been several minor meets held behind the lines in France and Italy that English, French, Italian and American military and athletic officials are thinking seriously of holding the big international track and field games in Paris sometime this fall.

Entries for these games would be obtained from America, England, Canada, France, Italy, Belgium and possibly other Allied nations. It is certain that the six nations mentioned would have troops on the western front and are interested in the development of athletics. The foremost athletes of each of these nations are enrolled in the armies fighting for democracy, and though a number of them have been killed or wounded, there are still many left, especially in the American and English forces, to make the games of international importance. The games would also aid in keeping up the interest in the Olympiad so that another could be held shortly after peace is declared. The last Olympic games were held in Stockholm, Sweden, in 1912. It was decided then that the next would be held in 1916 in Berlin. Because of a little more important skirmish in which the Berlin representatives were engaged with the rest of the world about that time, it was deemed advisable to call it off.

**Jennings' Batting Maxims.**

Batting is, and always will be, the great problem in baseball.

When I was a player I always used to try to figure out what the pitcher was going to give me.

Not a few really great batters make a slow start.

It is much the same proposition as a Marathon race. At the beginning of such a race you will seldom find the winner in front.

Every batter has his little peculiarities and mannerisms.

The position which a player occupies in the batting list affects his hitting to a considerable extent.

If he is picked as lead-off man he is practically ordered to top off at least thirty points from his batting average.

There are managers who consider the lead-off man the most important position in the batting order.

It has always seemed to me that the most difficult position on the line-up for the manager to fill acceptably was second place.

The second place man to be able to work to advantage must do three things.

He must be able to hit the right ball.

He must be able to keep the ball on the ground.

He must figure correctly the opposing player who is going to cover the bag and play him accordingly.

Willie Keeler was the best second place hitter I ever saw or ever expect to see.

The sacrifice has grown in favor with the passing years and most managers are inclined to use it quite freely.
