

wheat crop this year. An appeal must be made to the east, and this help should be timed to reach Winnipeg for distribution to needy points west from August 20th to September 10th. It is understood that harvesters' wages this year will be from \$3.50 to \$4 per bday, with board, for about three months' work.

May Prolong the Vacation. high schools of the Province of Ontario will not be opening for the fall term until October 1st. Paull, of the Department of Education, says that owing to the large number of boys and girls helping on the farms they had decided to alter the act in order to allow the farmers to retain the helpers until the end of the season. In many of the schools in the country towns advantage will be taken of this lengthening of the summer holi-
