HARVEST HANDS

In Urgent Demand to Save Western Wheat Crop.

R. L. Fairbairn, general passenger agent, Canadian Northern Railway, Toronto, states that as a result of a conference between their representatives and representatives of the Dominion and Provincial Governments at Winnipeg, it has been decided that at least 20,000 harvesters will be required over and above the local supply of help available to garner the western wheat crop this year.

An appeal must be made to the east, and this help should be timed to reach Winnipeg for distribution to needy points west from August 20th to September 10th. It is understood that harvesters' wages this year will be from \$3.50 to \$4 per day, with board, for about three months' work.

May Prolong the Vacation.

Some of the continuation and high schools of the Province of Ontario will not be opening for the fall term until October 1st. Mr. Paul, of the Department of Education, says that owing to the large number of boys and girls helping on the farms they had decided to alter the act in order to allow the farmers to retain the helpers until the end of the season. In many of the schools in the country towns advantage will be taken of this lengthening of the summer holidays.

The Races Were Good.

Napanee was well represented at the horse races at Kingston on Monday, says the Deseronto Post. The track was in excellent condition, the races were good, and the horses the finest in the country. A large crowd was in attendance, and a thoroughly good day's sport was enjoyed by all present. The success of the Kingston meet may encourage the Napanee Driving Park Association to put on fall races. If they do not need the gate money in their treasury they can devote it to patriotic purposes.
