A sturgeon weighing 185 pounds, containing 48 1/2 pounds of caviar, and valued at \$90, was caught in the River St. Clair at Sarnia.

The Union Bag and Paper Corporation, Glen Falls, N.Y., suffered a loss of more than \$750,000 in pulpwood as a result of a fire.

Corp. William Varley, soldier-labor candidate in North-east Toronto, charged that he had been approached three times to drop out of the field.

The Washington Post Office Department has announced the loss of 1,741 letters and other postal matter for Egypt through the sinking of a steamer in the Mediterranean Sea.

Germany as a sop to Finland for the adoption of monarchical form of Government has offered to use its influence to secure the cession by Russia of Eastern Karelia to the Finns.

Eleven Montreal restaurants were ordered by the Food Board to close for periods ranging from three to fifteen days on account of violating regulations.

Canada now holds the continental record for speed in wooden ship-building, the War Seneca having had its dock steam trial at Quebec forty-eight days after its launching, six days better than the best record in the United States so far.

Irene Leverton, a respected employee of the post office staff at Timmins, aged seventeen, was murdered in the reception room of the Hotel Goldfields by an Italian, Bella Donna, who had persisted in courting her, he then shot himself fatally.

The American steamship Poseidon, 1,911 tons gross, formerly under the Dutch flag, was sunk in a collision with an American tanker last Wednesday off the Delaware Capes. Five members of her crew of thirty-eight are reported missing.

Robert J. Young, twenty of whose thirty-five years have already been spent in jail, was brought to Montreal following his arrest in Hamilton on the charge of having robbed the Scott, Que., branch of the Banque Nationale, on July 4th, of \$5,000.

TRAVELS 16,000 MILES TO CLAIM HIS BRIDE

Sergeant F. H. Johnson Comes From Philippines to Wed at Watertown.

Watertown, N.Y., Aug. 3.—A 16,000-mile trip was made by Sergeant Frederick H. Johnson, of the Philippines, to be married on Thursday afternoon, Miss Edna H. Rickett, Three Mile Bay, being the bride. He has been in the city several days, but news of the wedding has been withheld from the parents of the couple.

Sergeant Johnson is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Duncan Johnson, of Watertown, and until 1908, when he enlisted in the regular army, had been a resident of that village. He has seen service on the Mexican border and two and a half years ago was sent to the Philippines, where he completed his enlistment of seven months before returning to this country. Miss Rickett is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bernard Rickett, Three Mile Bay.

GIVING ENEMY PLANS

Paid Agents of Von Papen Make Confession.

New York, Aug. 3.—Charged with plotting to supply German agents with plans and specifications of an aeroplane stabilizer, Hans Jacobson and Court Courant, both of German birth, were arrested by agents of the department of justice.

Courant was employed until a year ago in the plant which manufactures the stabilizers and had ready access to plans and specifications. He is said to have made copies of them in January, 1915, and turned them over to Jacobson, who in turn gave them to von Papen. After von Papen's departure another agent is said to have called for the plans and specifications at Jacobson's home.

The men also are alleged to have furnished von Papen and other agents with information as to steamers on which stabilizers were being shipped to France.

The new German ambassador to Russia, Dr. Karl Helfferich, has sent a note to Foreign Minister Trotsky at Moscow calling upon the Government to adopt stern measures against those guilty of the murder of Gen. von Elchhorn.

NEW BAPTIST PASTOR.

Began His Pastorate on Sunday—

Preached Five Discourses. Rev. J. S. La Flair commenced his pastorate at the First Baptist church on Sunday, preaching at the union services of the First Baptist and First Congregational churches. The morning service was held in the First Baptist church, and the evening service in the First Congregational church.

Rev. Mr. La Flair is a most impressive speaker, and delivered two strong discourses. At the morning service he spoke on the subject, "Our Greatest Ally," and chose as his text, John xv, 5: "I am the vine, ye are the branches. He that abideth in me, and I in him, the same bringeth forth much fruit; for without me, ye can do nothing."

The speaker referred to the fourth anniversary of the war, and asked the question, "What will the outcome of the war be? Will it be Christ, and the nation that abide in Christ, and the people who honor Him shall bear fruit. Out of the war would come better-fruit, if we would but abide in Him. If we did not abide in Him, we did not deserve a victory.

"Our greatest ally is not brave Belgium, France or the United States," said the speaker, "but our greatest ally in these days of warfare, and our greatest ally in the efforts to spread good tidings is Jesus Christ."

If Germany and Britain were both Christian, how could there be a conflict between them? Very often the cause of the war was asked for. The cause rested in Germany's religion, or lack of religion, in her interpretation of the word of God. Might did not make right, and not until this was understood would peace come.

The question was often raised as to how Christians could engage in such a conflict. We were not on the offensive, but taking up the defence, for freedom and justice.

And right at home we had a lesson to learn, and that was that we should not be looking for the weakness and mistakes in people. On the other hand we should be emphasizing the good that we can find in them. In every person there was good, if we but looked for it.

BYE-ELECTIONS COMING SOON.

Government Likely to Bring On Four In Short Time.

Toronto, Aug. 3.—The Ontario Government will likely carry out the announcement it made last spring and bring on the four bye-elections in the province this fall. Writs will be issued shortly, it is said, for the holding of these elections about the end of October or early in November. The vacancies are: North Brance, Lennox, North Oxford and Manlinthia. Although party leaders agreed that there should be no contests during war time, Liberals of North Brance and Smyrna, according to a report from the Greek Foreign Office to the relief committee for Greeks of Asia Minor given out here.

A Novel Fire Warning.

Toronto, Aug. 3.—The Hon. Howard Ferguson, Minister of Forests and Mines, for Ontario has adopted a plan of warning the children against fire. Some thousands of red colored lead pencils of Canadian make are being purchased and will be distributed in Ontario rural and other schools next term. Each pencil bears the warning printed on it, "Be careful about fires."

Devonshire CANADA. PROCLAMATION. GEORGE the FIFTH, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, KING, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India.

AND WE DO HEREBY STRICTLY WARN AND SOLEMNLY IMPRESS UPON ALL SUCH MEN, and as well those who employ, harbour, conceal or assist them in their disobedience, that, if they persist in their failure to report, absence or desertion until the expiry of the last mentioned day, they will be pursued and punished with all the rigour and severity of the law. SUBJECT TO THE JUDGMENT OF OUR COURTS MARTIAL WHICH WILL BE CONVENED TO TRY SUCH CASES or other competent tribunals: and also that those who employ, harbour, conceal or assist such men will be held strictly accountable as offenders and subject to the pains, penalties and forfeitures in that behalf by law provided for their said offence.

AND WHEREAS we desire, if possible, to avoid the infliction of the heavy penalties which the law imposes for the offences of which these soldiers have thus been guilty, and to afford them an opportunity within a limited time to report and make their services available in Our Canadian Expeditionary Force as is by law their bounden duty, and as is necessary for the defence of Our Dominion of Canada. NOW KNOW YE that we in the exercise of Our powers, and of Our good will and pleasure in that behalf, do hereby proclaim and declare and cause to be published and made known THAT THE PENALTIES OF THE LAW WILL NOT BE IMPOSED OR EXACTED as against the men who belong to Class I under Our Military Service Act, 1917, and who have disobeyed Our Proclamation aforesaid; or who have received notice from any of Our registrars or deputy registrars to report for duty on a day now past and have failed so to report; or who, having reported and obtained leave of absence, have failed to report at the expiry of their leave, or have become deserters from Our Expeditionary Force, PROVIDED THEY REPORT FOR DUTY ON OR BEFORE THE TWENTY FOURTH DAY OF AUGUST 1918.
