WATER NOT CONTAMINATED

CAUSE OF TYPHOID FEVER CASES IS UNKNOWN.

A Number of People Are Affected With What is Thought to be

Various rumors that are going the rounds in the city regarding the prevalence of typhoid fever are minmized by competent officials. Several cases have been reported to the health department since the beginning of the week, but it has not approached anything like an epidemic

During the past ten days some children in the village of Portsmouth have been suffering from a peculiar malady which is practically unknown in this part of the country A high fever develops and the youngsters have been very ill. He said that tests of the water were made daily and that the records of two weeks ago showed no evidences of contamination. To-day the water shows no contamination. It is, therefore, difficult to ascertain the reason for the cases that are de-
